OSU Teacher Grads in High Demand; Most Stay in State

About two-thirds of the June teaching graduates from Oregon State university are teaching this fall in Oregon schools but the record demand for teachers is bringing school administrators from across the U.S. to the campus for interviews with seniors.

Mrs. Kathryn H. Smith, director of teacher placement at OSU, says more administrators than ever before have scheduled campus interview dates for this winter. They will come from as far away as New York, Chicago, Hawaii, Alaska and Guam.

A total of 363 seniors were graduated from OSU teacher preparation programs in June.

203 Accept Oregon Positions

Of these, 203 accepted teaching jobs in Oregon; 79 are now instructing in other states, mostly California; and eight were unavailable for teaching jobs because of military service, graduate school, marriage, other jobs, etc.

Starting salary for the teachers this fall averaged around \$5000, Mrs. Smith indicated.

Opportunities are especially good for men in elementary education, Mrs. Smith noted.

Biggest teacher shortage fields in junior and senior high schools now are English (particularly for women teachers), physical sciences (physics, chemistry, mathematics), girls' physical education and foreign languages.

Teach More Than One Subject

Teaching opportunities are considerably brighter in some fields than others, Mrs. Smith noted. Junior and senior high school instructors are expected to teach more than one subject.

In addition to helping place new graduates in their first teaching jobs, Mrs. Smith also helps

graduates of past years to find better positions.

Practically all job-seeking teachers were placed, she said. Exceptions include a few persons who were asking for a specific location.
