HOME IS A WONDERFUL PLACE

... but if it's safety you want, you may be better off in a factory, on a highway or at the swimming pool.

Almost as many people are injured in home accidents each year as in all other accidents put together. And this just counts those which were serious enough to cause a person to stay home for at least a day. Twenty thousand people are injured at home each year and 34 percent of these injuries are due to falls.

For safety, be sure waxed floors are well buffed, don't put throw rugs at the top or bottom of stairs and have all halls and stairs well lighted.

WATER SPOTS ON WINDOWS

... after lawn spraying are often hard to get off. The chemicals in the water vary in different localities, so what works in one place may be a failure in another.

Some women tell us they use a commercial rust remover; others report success with a copper cleaner or soap-filled scouring pads that you use on pots and pans.

In several instances, where the spots are due to hard water minerals, water softener does the trick.

GREASE SPOTS ON WALLPAPER

... may be removed by covering generously with French chalk, which you get at a drug store. After 24 hours, remove the chalk with a soft cloth. Chalk absorbs the grease. Corn starch is a good absorbent also, but may be more difficult to hold on the wall.

Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WITH THE COMING OF COOL WEATHER

... children and coloring books move indoors. Crayons and rugs don't make a happy relationship. Treat stains immediately with a small amount of dry cleaning fluid and blot with tissues. Keep this up until no more crayon shows on the tissues.

Next, mix one teaspoon of light-duty detergent with one cup of warm water and sponge small amounts on the stain. Blot after each application.

When spot is gone, put several layers of tissue over the area and weight down with a stack of books for about six hours. Replace with dry tissue and weight again.

COMPLAINTS

... that some rug backings cause trouble with floor finishes have come to us.

One laboratory tells us that rubber, rubber-like or plastic foam backings are not always compatible with the wide variety of varnishes, lacquers, paints and other floor finishes available today. Both the floors and rugs may be harmed by misuse.

Experts advise that rugs with these backings be laid over a layer of felt or building paper. Avoid using mats or throw rugs with colored backing on light-colored vinyl floors.

... enjoy working or be bored and unhappy. Just in case it's the latter, there are still two things to do—Challenge ourselves to find easier ways to do the job and really change or just drift along and get by. Enjoying work depends on growing to fit the job.

IS IT TRUE WHAT THEY SAY ABOUT TEENAGERS?

... Do they take less responsibility at home nowadays? Mrs. Roberta Frasier, OSU Extension family life specialist, gives this answer.

"Teenagers are not as free from chores as some people believe. As more mothers work outside the home, more youngsters take on housework, meal preparation and planning. Even in homes where mother isn't working, today's teenagers are active helpers."

"A survey conducted in part of the state of Washington showed that over a fourth of the boys helped with housework, meal preparation and washing dishes."

"The percentage of girls helping was much higher, with only 10 percent escaping housework. Eighty-four percent helped with meal preparation and washing dishes. Teenagers home activities are not limited to cooking, housework and dishes, but this is the major activity."

IT'S HELPFUL TO CHILDREN

... if parents tell them what they can do as well as what they can't do. This is the suggestion of Mrs. Roberta Frasier, OSU Extension family life specialist. Instead of a "don't do that," try providing the youngster with a better way of doing. "Wait at the corner" brings better results than "don't run in the street."

One little five-year-old put it very well when after a series of "no's and don'ts" he said to his daddy, "Isn't there anything little boys can do?"

Check up on yourself some time. How many "no's" and how many "can do's" do you offer in a 15-minute period? If the balance is on the "no's" side, try to change them into "can do's."

To remove clear tape from paper or cardboard without tearing the surface, heat the tape with the point of a warm iron. This softens the adhesive and tape pulls off.

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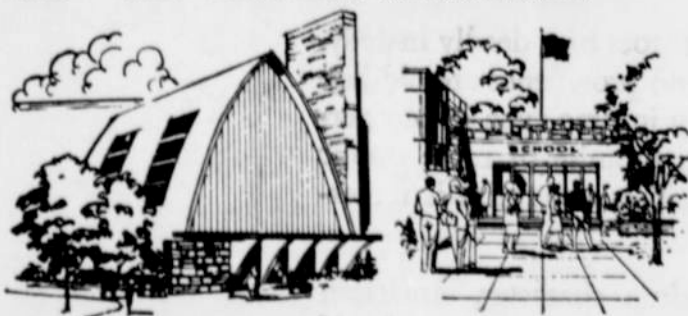
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
