

Postmaster Dail Offers Suggestions For Mailing Yule Packages Overseas

The period Nov. 1 to Nov. 20 is designated for mailing of Christmas parcels for members of Armed Services overseas. The "term" Armed Services includes personnel of our Armed Forces, members of their families and authorized U.S. civilian employees overseas, who receive their mail through an APO, FPO or NPO. The period for mailing air parcels overseas is Dec. 1 to 10.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, fiberboard or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard, wrapped in heavy paper. Each box should be tied with heavy cord, nailed or screwed shut, completely filled with sufficient cushioning material to prevent rattling or loosening of articles inside the package.

Enclosed should be a slip listing the contents, also the addressee's name and address. Form 2966 or 2976A, Custom Declaration completed by the sender, is required on parcels to many destinations.

Certain Items Prohibited

In addition to articles normally prohibited in mail, matches of all kinds and lighter fluids may not be mailed to overseas addressees. Cigarettes and other tobacco products, coffee and various other items are prohibited to many destinations of military post offices.

Domestic rates of postage are applicable and must be fully prepaid. Domestic air mail rates also apply. Addressee must be complete and legible and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink.

Gift parcels for patrons of distant states within the continental U.S. should be mailed on or before the week of Dec. 2-7 to insure delivery before Christmas. Gift parcels for local or nearby areas should be mailed not later than Dec. 14.

Urges Early Card Mailing

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10 and for local or nearby areas not later than Dec. 15. There will be no delivery of letter mail on Christmas day, other than special delivery mail.

Surface mail for Alaska and Hawaii should be mailed not later than Dec. 1 to insure delivery before Christmas. Greeting cards mailed at the first class rate of five cents per ounce may be sealed and contain written messages and will be given priority of dispatch, delivery and forwarding. They will also be returned to the sender if undeliverable, provided the return address is shown.

Greeting cards, third class rate of four cents per ounce, may not contain writing inside, nor be sealed and will not be forwarded unless within the office of original address. They will not be returned to the sender but will be disposed of as undeliverable.

Use Zip Code Number
Patrons making mailings of any class of mail will materially aid the Post Office department by mailing early in the season as well as early in the day, which will avoid long waiting periods standing in line. This year be sure to include your Zip Code Number in your return address so that your once-a-year correspondence will be notified of your complete and correct address. Everyone cooperating this year will materially aid in the speeding up of mail delivery this year as well as years to come.

The use of special delivery and special handling on parcels and letter mail speeds up the delivery of the mail as it travels along with first class mail and is delivered on Sundays, holidays and hours after the post office is closed. This mail will also be delivered to street addresses used on items even though an addressee normally receives mail in a post office box or elsewhere.

Sale of the new Christmas stamp for 1963 will begin Nov. 2 and may be used on all classes of mail.

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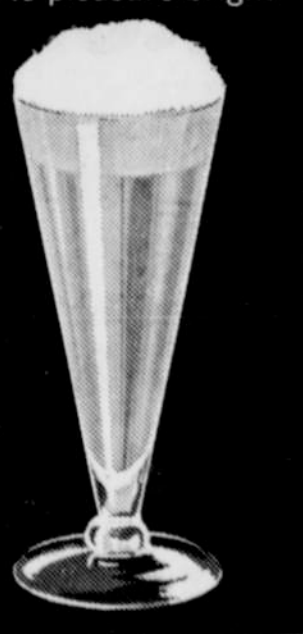
