

BLM National Council to Study Role Of Public Lands Monday in Ontario

The future role of BLM-administered public lands is a major topic for consideration by the National Advisory Board council at its meeting in Oregon on Nov. 4-6, Russell E. Getty, Bureau of Land Management state director for Oregon and Washington, announced this week.

"This is the first meeting of the council in the state of Oregon," Getty said. "Board members will participate in business sessions in Ontario, Oregon, on Monday, Nov. 4, and will observe BLM accomplishments in land management during a tour of the Vale district in southeastern Oregon the following two days," he added.

An intensive resource management program, designated the Vale project, was inaugurated last year with the appropriation of \$2 million for the purpose.

Panel Discussions Planned

Leading the panel discussion of the future role of public lands will be Jack Binford of Portland who is national past president of the Izaak Walton league of America.

Former Governor Charles A. Sprague will head another panel to discuss the functions of advisory boards.

Panel participants will include Representative Al Ullman; Dr. Charles McKinley of Reed college; Lyle Liggett, director of public relations of the American National Cattlemen's association; and R. J. Smith, president of the Western Association of State Fish and Game Commissioners.

Representatives From 10 States

The 42-man National Advisory Board council is composed of three representatives from each of 10 western states, elected by the BLM district advisory boards, plus 12 members who were appointed by Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall.

Judge Dan Hughes of Montrose, Colo., currently serves as co-chairman of the council, along with Secretary Udall who has

delegated his responsibility as co-chairman to BLM Director Charles H. Stoddard.

The latter said that he welcomed the opportunity to confer with members of the council in seeking means to more effectively manage the resources of BLM-administered lands.

Varied Interests Concerned

Oregon members of the NABC are Henry Gerber and Theodore R. Conn of Lakeview, James Weber and Judge Lloyd Rea, both of Baker. The elected members of the council represent cattle, sheep and wildlife interests while the appointed members represent other varied interests of the public.

During the two-day tour of the Vale district, council members will have the opportunity to observe projects to control undesirable brush, revegetate depleted ranges with crested wheatgrass and to develop and distribute water for use by livestock.

They will also see recent, widespread effects of the sagebrush webworm and observe roads and fire lookout stations constructed to protect the 4.5 million acres managed by the Vale district. Erosion control measures and fences constructed for better livestock management also will be observed.

County Board of Health to Maintain Present Status; Urges Influenza Shots

At the regular meeting of the Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health association held Oct. 22, the board of directors voted to maintain the local status of the association.

The National Tuberculosis association has recommended a plan of reorganization for the state of Oregon which would consolidate local counties into have a professional program worker who would work with local boards to plan programs and procure volunteers for x-ray surveys and Christmas Seal campaigns.

The board unanimously decided that local control of program and finances would be more desirable.

Under health education, it was reported that radio station KSRV, in cooperation with the county association, was broadcasting spot announcements urging the public

to get flu shots, especially those people in the high risk groups.

A story also appeared in the Oct. 11 issue of the Journal urging area residents to get the flu immunization. The article was released by the state board of health and stated that since the Oregon area was not hit hard last year by influenza, as other parts of the country were, it is quite possible that the area would have many cases of the epidemic this year.

"The Fire Next Time" by James Baldwin. Two sharply worded comments, in the form of letters, on the potentially fatal and destructive estrangement of white and Negro Americans.

"Congo, My Country" by Patrice Lumumba. A posthumous volume written in 1956 voices the late Congolese leader's plea to the Belgians - Congolese community for democracy, for moderation and for noncommunist institutions in addition to a defense of many aspects of colonialism.

"The Fighting Ghettos" by Meyer Barkai. Firsthand accounts of Jewish resistance to the Germans.

"By Quentin Reynolds" by Quentin Reynolds. An autobiography of the famed war correspondent.

"The Origin of Races" by Carleton S. Coon. A new approach to the origin and evolution of man.

"About Prints" by S. W. Hayter. A discussion of contemporary developments in etching and engraving techniques.

"Profiles in Faith" by Glenn D. Kittler. Inspiring stories of the religious leaders who helped make America a land of enduring faith.

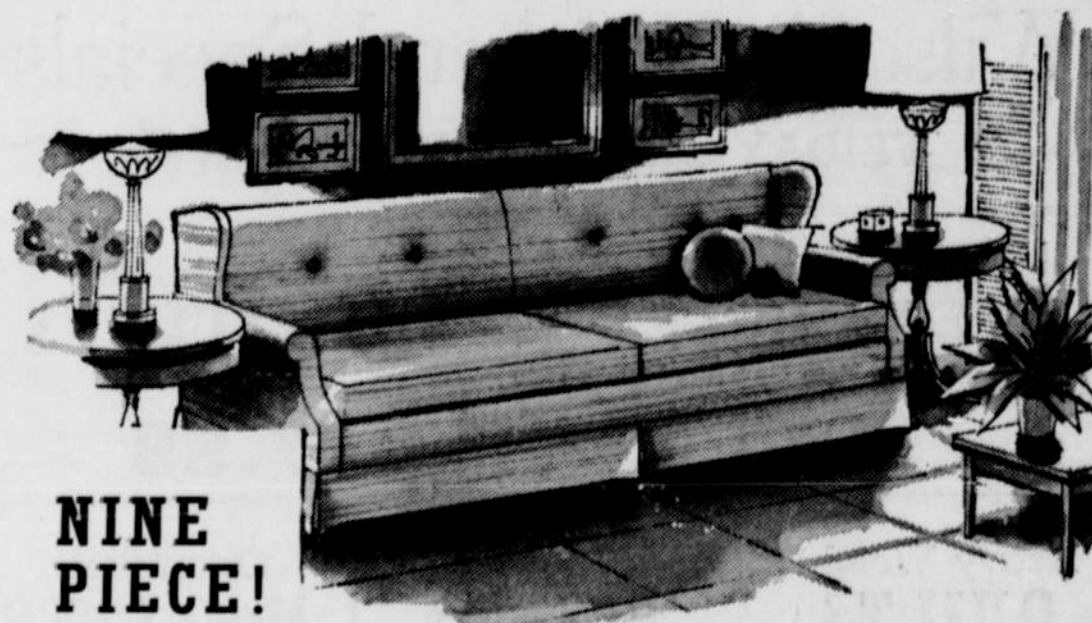
Karen and David Saunders of Northwest Nazarene college at Nampa were weekend guests of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Saunders.
