County Agent Offers Advice to Ranchers On Range Seeding

The sage defoliating moth has given ranchers an opportunity to do some successful range reseeding by eliminating or weakening sagebrush over thousands of acres of range, according to George Bain, county extension agent.

On ranges where native grasses have been depleted due to fire, rodent damage, use or whatever cause, and sagebrush has been a limiting factor, a successful reseeding program can be undertaken.

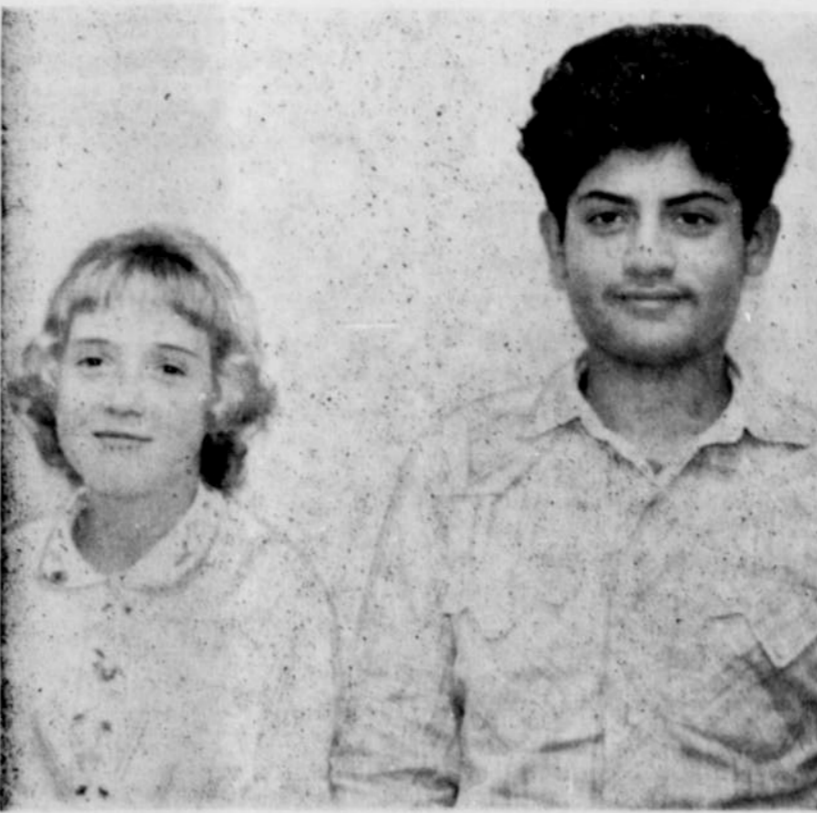
The Bureau of Land Management has some very good stands of native grasses mixed with crested wheat which was drilled following sage removal by spraying. The crested wheatgrass filled in the open areas and thickened some of the thinner areas of native grasses.

If there is a good stand of native bunch grass in the defoliated area, there is no particular advantage in reseeding, Bain says, since the native grasses will strengthen and produce an increased amount of forage due to less competition for available water and plant nutrients.

Another advantage of reseeding, Bain points out, is to introduce good competition for undesirable plants that may come into these defoliated areas such as medusa head, halogeton, mustard, rabbit brush and others.

The seeding should be done in the late fall with a rangeland drill which is heavily constructed and can stand the rough terrain and drill in old sagebrush and in rocky areas. Bain urges landowners interested to contact him so arrangements can be made for a drill to accomplish the seeding.
