Details of the Final Count

In order to maintain the utmost secrecy as to the number of subscriptions and votes secured by each candidate during the last three days of the campaign the race will be brought to a close under a sealed ballot box system. No subscriptions or money will be accepted from candidates during the last three days of the campaign; instead the candidates will deposit their final collections and subscriptions in the sealed ballot box located in the office of this newspaper. The campaign manager will collect from subscribers who come to the office to pay and will put slips and money in the ballot box for whatever candidate the subscriber designates to receive credit. If any candidates cannot come to the office they may mail their report to the campaign manager who will see it gets in the sealed box, providing it arrives by the closing hour.
