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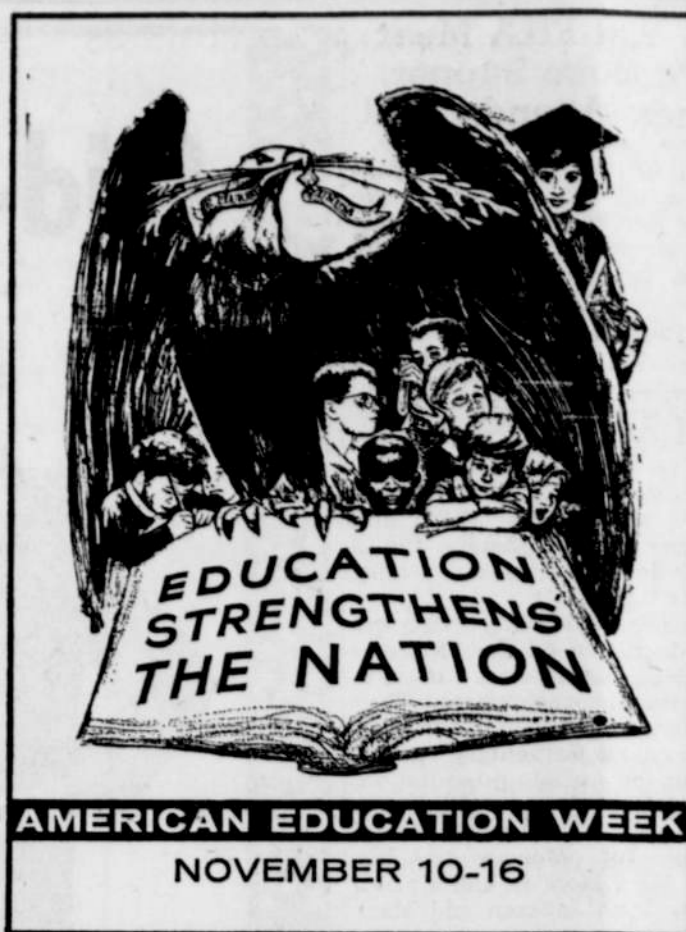
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Seniors Hear Representatives Speak

Sponsored locally by the Greater Boise Chamber of Commerce, Glenn A. Lungren, president, reports that four top business leaders will serve as a panel to lead the discussion on major issues pre-selected by student leaders who plan to attend.
