

JUDGES' STATEMENT

We, the undersigned, appointed to make the final count of votes and points in the Gate City Journal's subscription campaign, were present at the Journal office Saturday evening, after the closing hour for making of final reports by the candidates.

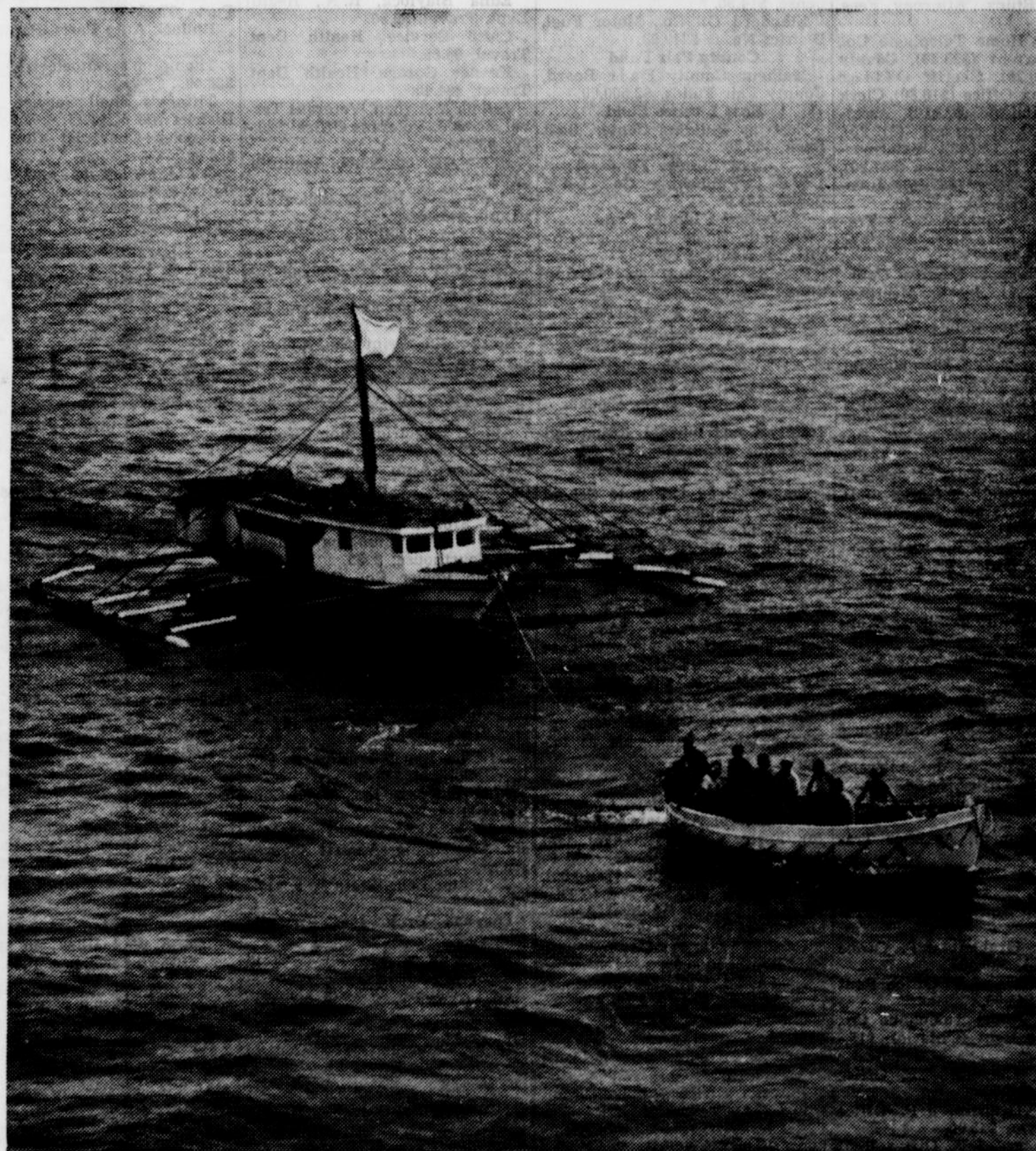
