Lawyers Oppose 'Security Fund' In Secret Voting

At 5 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 15, the Oregon State Bar association conducted a secret ballot, mail poll of the lawyers in Oregon on a proposal by the association to establish a "Clients' Security Fund," to reimburse any client suffering loss through defalcation, embezzlement, conversion or misappropriation by an Oregon lawyer of funds of such client.

Approximately 2,533 ballots were mailed from the bar office Nov. 1 and 1846 valid ballots were returned and tabulated. The vote was as follows:

A total of 658 lawyers voted for the proposition, "I favor the establishment by the Oregon State Bar of a Clients' Security Fund by allocation thereto, annually, by the Board of Governors, from the general funds of the Bar, of the sum of \$10,000, or such lesser sum as the Board of Governors shall determine."

One hundred and nine members declined to vote on the proposition "because I have insufficient information on which to base an opinion."

Voting against establishment of the Clients' Security Fund were 1079 lawyers.
