# Rites to Be Conducted At 2 O'clock Today For Anna Kratzberg

Funeral services for Mrs. Anna Kratzberg will be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, Nov. 21, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister will be the Rev. Wallace Prowell of the Nyssa Christian church.

Mrs. Kratzberg succumbed on Tuesday in Malheur Memorial hospital following an extended illness.

She was born Feb. 9, 1912, in Oklahoma, a daughter of George and Jennie Baker. At an early age, the deceased came west to Reedsport, Ore., with her parents and attended schools in that vicinity.

She came to the Nyssa area around 1935 and on Feb. 9, 1937, she was united in marriage to Fred W. Kratzberg at Payette, Idaho. Prior to her illness, she was an active member of the Nyssa Christian church and local Rebekah lodge.

In addition to Mr. Kratzberg of the home, she is survived by one son, Carl Henderson of Lakeside, Ore.; two daughters, Mrs. Robert L. Moore of Ontario and Miss Frieda Kratzberg of Salem.

Other survivors include her mother, Mrs. Jennie Baker and a sister, Mrs. Edna Snell, both of Reedsport; an uncle, Robert Brown of Springfield, Ore., and four grandchildren. Her father and one sister, Pearl, preceded her in death.

"Alone No Longer" by Stanley Stein. The story of a Texan who contracted leprosy in the 1930's and of his fight to change the image of the disease in the public mind.

"A Schoolmaster With the Blackfeet Indians" by Douglas Gold. Stories and sketches about life on the Montana reservation written by a missionary's son who lived among the inhabitants for nearly 25 years.

"The Organization of American States" by John C. Dreier. An examination of the Organization of American States in which the author assesses its achievements and its shortcomings, its problems and opportunities.

"The Consumers Union Report on Smoking and the Public Interest" by Ruth Brecher. A broad-scale review of the medical evidence and a look at the record of the tobacco industry.

"The Effects of Federal Programs on Higher Education" by Harold Orlans. A revised, expanded report of a study made at the request of the U.S. Office of Education.

"No Saints Suddenly" by Hazen G. Werner. Twenty-one perceptive messages that challenge the reader to Christian commitment and growth in order to serve and right our present age.

"Rodeo" by Sam Savitt. The author explains and illustrates the five main events of the rodeo.

"Heraldic Design" by Hubert Alcock. Illustrates and explains heraldic history and heraldic terms.

"Our Mother's House" by Julian Gloag. The story of seven small children who live in a London suburb. Their mother has just died and they have never seen their father. Faced with the terror of separation, they bury their mother in the garden and pretend to outsiders that she is ill.

"A Sense of Reality" by Graham Greene. His latest collection of short stories.

"Ice Station Zebra" by Alistair MacLean. A novel of suspense and intrigue.

"March to Calumny" by Albert D. Biderman. An account of American POW's in the Korean war.

According to Oregon Blue Book for 1963-64, there are 22,689 people within the county and were they all paying taxes it would still be \$150 for each man, woman and child to pay annually to run the governments. But there are many drawing welfare who are tax burdens instead of tax contributors, not to mention the children—so the increase falls on the same people each year.

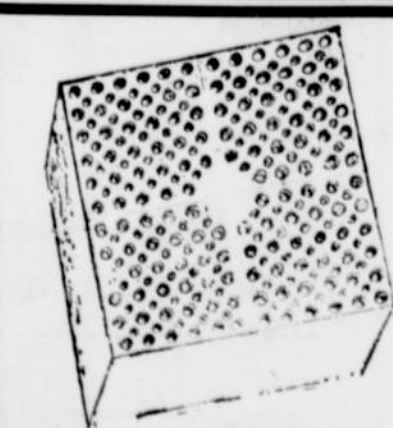
