

Book on President Kennedy's Service In World War II Available at Library

Librarian Joy Bell announces the following volumes have recently been added to the shelves of Nyssa library:

ADULT BOOKS

"PT-109—John F. Kennedy in World War II" by Robert J. Donovan. The skipper of the PT boat was a skinny, handsome, boyish lieutenant from Boston named John Fitzgerald Kennedy. Lt. Kennedy spent 30 of the next 36 hours in the water. Ten other men on PT-109 survived to tell of his cool courage. This accurate,

completely authenticated story, not only of PT-109 but of all of President Kennedy's exploits in World War II, is told here for the first time by Robert J. Donovan.

"The Cry for Help" by Norman L. Farberow, Ph.D., and Edwin S. Schneidman, Ph.D. "The Community Response to the Cry for Help" describes agencies that have been established in the community of Los Angeles and in other communities throughout the world specifically to respond to the suicidal cry. "The therapeutic response to the cry for help" reflects the approaches of several therapist-clinicians in terms both of theoretical formulations about the personality in which suicidal processes occur and of therapeutic techniques that may be employed.

"The Basic Book of the Cat" by William H. A. Carr. Here is a truly essential book on cats. Warmly and succinctly written, the volume contains all the practical information a cat owner could require—whether veteran, tyro or prospective—including advice on acquiring a cat, its physiology and behavior, the care of kittens and adult cats, first aid and health care.

"A Woman Set Apart" by William and Ellen Hartley. Harriet M. Bedell, a Protestant Episcopal Deaconess, has lived a life of spiritual and physical adventure. In the course of her work, Deaconess Bedell has ridden horseback for thousands of miles in Oklahoma and has driven a dog team in Alaska over terrain regarded by natives as being too rough for passage.

"The Education of American Teachers" by James B. Conant. Among the most complex and controversial issues in public education today is the question of how teachers themselves should be educated. Long a subject of heated debate between members of academic faculties and their colleagues in schools of education, it has increasingly involved the lay public as well.

"The Last Love" by Thomas B. Costain. The story of Napoleon and "Betsey" is based on fact but Thomas B. Costain has elected to tell it in the form of a novel. He has made it into a narrative of great tenderness and understanding.

"Religions in America" by Leo Rosten. The famous Look magazine series, greatly amplified—with over 400 pages of new, authoritative facts, figures, charts, tables, basic source material and reference aids.
