Funeral services for Wilfred Harold Whincup will be conducted at 10 o'clock Friday morning, Dec. 27, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister will be the Rev. Armand Larive of St. Paul's Episcopal church.

Mr. Whincup succumbed Tuesday in the couple's upstairs apartment at the local funeral home following a brief illness.

He was born Aug. 11, 1892, at High Wycombe, England, a son of William and Eleanor Adamson Whincup. On Christmas day 1915 he was united in marriage to Nora Pearl Collins-Harper in London.

The deceased was employed as an electrical engineer while residing in England and following his retirement approximately seven years ago he and Mrs. Whincup came to Nyssa. He was a member of the Episcopal church and served as a Royal Air Force pilot during both world wars.
