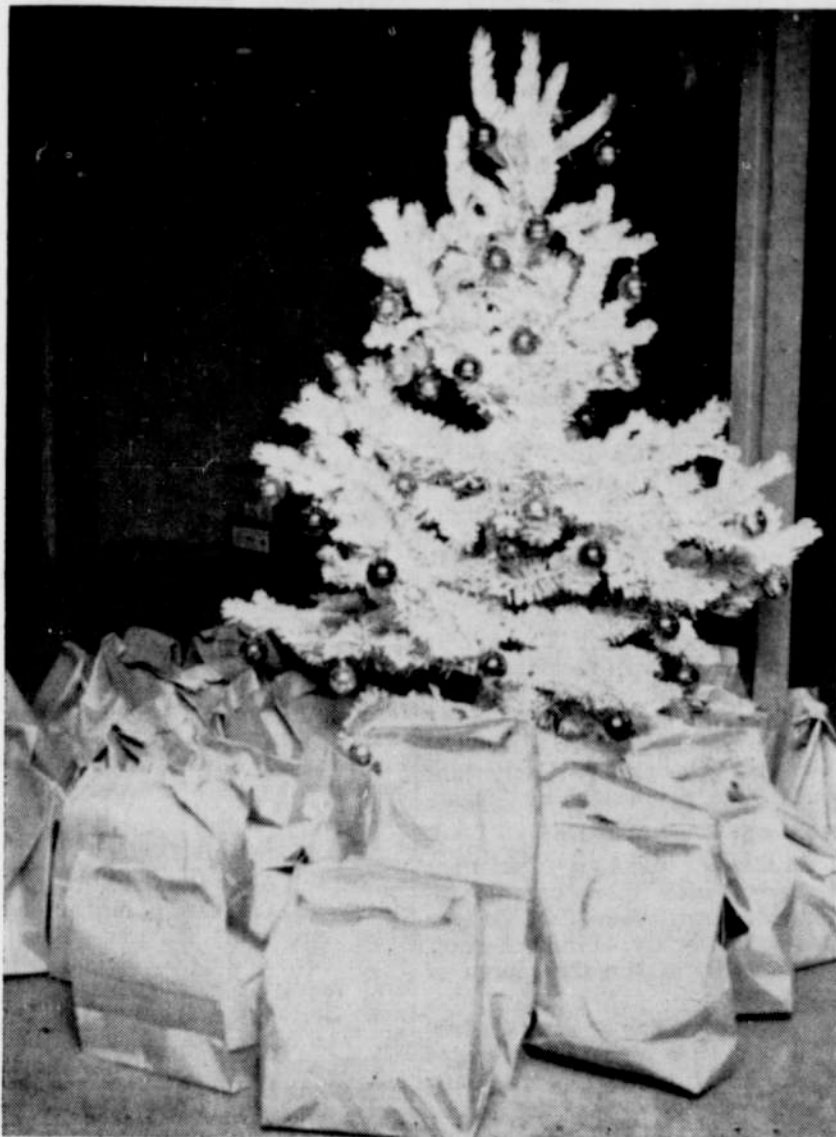


### Toys for Needy Tots

large segment of the population owned but little, if any, property and hence did not share in the costs although they had children to be educated.

**Sales Tax Considered**  
He said possibility of a sales tax being the solution to the problem had been considered by the Idaho group making the original study but that they decided this was not the full answer. This, he said, would also place the tax on those least able to pay.

Roberts said a group of farmers in his community had decided to make an Oregon study with sufficient financial backing to carry it to a conclusion.

To do this they had pledged of 35 farmers for \$100 each, were getting pledges from at least 25 commercial firms in towns of the county and then return to the farmers for 40 more pledges for a \$10,000 total.

### D. Nelson to Take Active Part in Oil Growers Meeting

Dick Nelson of Nyssa will take an active part in annual meeting of the Oregon Essential Oil Growers league at Oregon State university Jan. 9-10. Nelson is finishing his first year as vice president of the organization.

Verticillium wilt, long a foe of mint growers, will be a main topic of the session. Dr. Ralph Green, plant pathologist at Purdue university, will speak on crop sequence and wilt control. Dr. C. E. Horner, OSU plant pathologist, will report on the OSU verticillium research program.

Dr. Horner will also moderate a panel discussion of growers who will talk about flaming, plowing or chemicals as ways to control verticillium. Dr. Horner and H. E. Finnell, OSU extension certification specialist, will review certification of mint stocks.

"Chewing Gum — Product of Forest and Field" will be the subject of J. I. Weeks, director of product control for William Wrigley, Jr. company of Chicago. Dr. P. O. Ritcher, head of the OSU entomology department, will review symphylian research.

Marion D. Thomas, OSU extension agricultural economist, will report on the market outlook for spearmint and peppermint for the coming year.

Guest speaker at the annual banquet will be John H. Williams, special agent-in-charge, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Portland. He will speak on "The FBI and You."
