Students at Adrian Reflect Enthusiasm In Election Campaign

Enthusiasm radiated in the voice of Mike Robb, an Adrian eighth grade student, as he told a Journal reporter of the campaign and forthcoming election of class officers in Patrick O'Laughlin's room.

The election between the Whigs and Tories will be held tomorrow (Friday), but in the meantime a vigorous campaign is in progress with traditional banners waving and candidate speeches being made.

Mike is campaign manager for the Whigs whose slate of officers is headed by Ernest Lewis as presidential candidate. Other officer nominees are Laura Mackey, vice president; Paula McBride, secretary; Diana Okano, treasurer; and Timmy Holly, sergeant-at-arms.

Judge Reprimands Local Policemen For Jail Escapes

In dismissing an indictment Friday against Francisco Garcia, charged with escape from Nyssa city jail in December, Circuit Judge Jeff D. Dorroh, Jr., used the occasion to reprimand Nyssa Police Chief F. E. Petrie and Officer Robert Grover for "lax custody procedures."

Garcia was in jail serving sentence for assault handed down by circuit court at the time of the escape. The county jail was under construction at the time and city jails were used for county prisoners. According to the judge, "Garcia walked out of the jail while on a cleaning detail and the officer in charge stepped into the office to answer the telephone."

Dorroh noted that there had been two other non-violent escapes from the Nyssa jail since June 1962, and that while Petrie was not chief in the first two cases, he said, "I do not intend that the circuit court will be used to compound the laxity of the Nyssa police department in the holding of their prisoners."

The judge further noted that he had not been informed officially of Garcia's escape and demanded a full report with any disciplinary action that may have followed. He demanded the report by Friday, Jan. 17, and said that he would decide at that time if he would file contempt of court proceedings against the officers.

Petrie told a Journal reporter Wednesday afternoon that the report requested had been prepared by him and City Attorney Hal Henigson and mailed to Judge Dorroh that day.
