New Books Listed At County Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, Jan. 18, at Malheur county library include the following:

"The Week Before Pearl Harbor" by A. A. Hoebling. The crescendo of events, the confusion, apathy and personal rivalries that culminated in the disastrous attack on Pearl Harbor.

"A Kind of Magic" by Edna Ferber. Autobiographical sequel to "A Peculiar Treasure."

"The Cherokees" by Grace Steele Woodward. A history of the Cherokees from the Spanish explorations of 1540 to the present and a record of a people from the Stone Age civilization through the tragedy of conquest and relocation to a triumph of achievement.

"India and Pakistan" by Hugh Tinker. A political analysis.

"Hungary" by C. A. Macartney. A useful outline of Hungarian history.

"The Enterprising Americans" by John Chamberlain. An account of the growth of American business from its early beginnings to the great trade and industrial complexes which span the free world of today.

"Firearms" by Howard Ricketts. A short history of firearms to mid-19th century.

"Relativity for the Millions" by Martin Gardner. In a clear, uncomplicated exposition requiring

"The American Way of Death" by Jessica Mitford. This explosive and astonishing book makes public the fantastic inner workings of our funeral industry. The grotesqueries we glimpsed in Evelyn Waugh's novel "The Loved One" pale before the actuality as Miss Mitford discloses the bizarre facts behind the average American funeral, coast to coast.

"Hope and Help for Your Nerves" by Dr. Claire Weeks. In this age of anxiety, few escape the strains of nervous tension and daily there are more who suffer nervous breakdowns. Indeed, nervous disorder is so common that it is often viewed as a fair price to pay for living in today's tense, complex and highly competitive world. Dr. Claire Weeks provides a lucid explanation of the causes of nervous tension and breakdown, and she presents a commonsense yet scientific program of daily action for coping with these disorders.

"A Senate Journal" by Allen Drury.

To be eligible for the test, you must have had at least two years of home economics and have an interest in that field.

The tests are prepared and published by the Science and Research Association. They are knowledge and attitude tests designed to see what the American girl knows.

After being given by the home economics teacher, the tests are sent to Betty Crocker Research Center in Minneapolis, Minn., where they are graded by an IBM machine.

Held for Future Reference

When the test scores have been returned they are placed on the student's permanent record sheets for future reference.

Besides the trip to Washington, state and national winners receive scholarships and the school winners are awarded pins.

The mountain snow pack began to accumulate at an early date but the rate of accumulation fell off so that snow now varies on Jan. 1 from a low of 26 percent on the Willamette to a high of 81 percent on the Burnt river. Reservoir water supplies are mostly satisfactory and the soils in mountain watersheds are relatively well recharged.

The next report on snow surveys and water supply conditions will be issued about Feb. 10, 1964.
