Manager Zobell Tells Importance of Beets

lene plastic to cover the sides and tops of beets stored in the piles. This is the equivalent of 30 acres for the sides of the piles and 20 acres for the tops.

Then came the problem of keeping the covers on the piles. Tires, lumber and various other items were used in trying to hold the covers in place. But with the large surfaces covered, winds whipped them off very easily. Finally the company tried mixing straw and asphalt and this seems to work better than any other solution and the beets are keeping very well, Zobell said.

Consider New Contracts

The sugar company and growers are concerned about the decrease in sugar content to the extent that when negotiating for new contracts next week, quality will be one of the factors to be considered.

Smaller beets usually carry a higher sugar content than the jumbo type. Thus the higher returns from increased tonnage have been offset somewhat by lower sugar content.

Factors entering into the amount of sugar are weather, nitrogen and amount of water used for irrigation.

Outlook Good for 1964

Zobell said the price of sugar is about 50 cents per hundred-weight higher than normal, the irrigation water supply report seems favorable for this time of year, and that farmers of the area are blessed with good soil and "know-how" in farming. All these make for a good outlook for the coming year when about the same acreage will be contracted as in 1963.

Another point the speaker brought out was that bankers, merchants and everyone should encourage and talk crop diversification, saying it was not good to put the entire farm into one crop and gamble on it.

Fewer Laborers Being Used

He said sugar beets and some row crops made for a better economy than legume seeds. And fewer laborers were going to be used each year due to such factors as monogerm beet seed, weedicides, improved weeder and other farm machinery.

Zobell said Amalgamated did not expect to erect any new plants in the near future. With union conditions being what they are and with government regulations and taxes as we have today, the company prefers to put its money into government bonds.

Existing plants will be improved with man-saving machinery being installed to cut processing time.
