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rell said. Only apples, which gained in both volume and value, topped the 1962 season. Total tonnage of tree fruits was off 43 percent, with value down 27 percent.

Tree nut output was about the same as in 1962, but higher prices on both filberts and walnuts pushed the combined value of these nuts up nearly a tenth, she added. Oregon produces 95 percent of the nation's filberts, but only five percent of the walnuts.

Strawberries Show Drop

Berry crops were off 12 percent in volume and eight percent in value. Strawberries, which comprise more than half the berry tonnage and nearly half the value, accounted for the lion's share of the drop, Mrs. Horrell noted.

Despite the same acreage as 1962, lower yields and lower processing prices shaved both strawberry volume and values. Tame blackberries were also down in 1963, but other canberries showed increase.

Fewer Oregon vegetables reached both fresh markets and processors in 1963, but higher prices pushed values up 17 percent to the highest level of record. Recovering from comparatively low 1962 prices, onions bounced back to rank ninth in terms of value in Oregon and sixth nationally.

The state's output of snap beans for processing topped all previous records and continues to lead the nation in both tonnage and value.
