Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Friday For Silas B. Hoffman

Funeral services for Silas B. Hoffman were conducted Friday afternoon, Jan. 24, 1964, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Wallace Prowell, pastor of the Nyssa Christian church.

Mr. Hoffman succumbed Jan. 21 at Malheur Memorial hospital following major surgery.

He was born Sept. 13, 1885, at Eddyville, Neb., a son of Fredrick and Mary Hoffman, and was the youngest of 13 children. All preceded him in death, including a sister who died on Jan. 16 this year at Susanville, Calif.

The deceased was reared on a farm, attended schools in Callaway, Neb., and also studied at a business college in Broken Bow, Neb.

On March 23, 1907, he was united in marriage to Blanche Belle Maze at Callaway. They made their home on a farm near Lodi, Neb., until September 1908 when they moved to Callaway where he was manager of a lumber yard for 10 years. He also managed lumber firms at Elmcreek and Oconto, Neb.

In 1919 the family moved once again to a farm near Lodi where they resided until 1933 when they began farming near Broken Bow. The Hoffmans homesteaded on the Owyhee project in December 1936 when they came to the Nyssa area. The deceased also worked 13 years for the Bureau of Reclamation until he retired in 1957.

In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. Hoffman is survived by three sons, Hugh of Callaway, Neb., Glenn and Leland of Nyssa; two daughters, Mrs. James (Roxie) Ritchie of Nyssa and Mrs. Claude (Lois) Day of Adrian.

Other survivors include a foster-son, David Highland of Prairie City, Ore., 19 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Interment was made in Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Active pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased. Honorary bearers included Emil Stunz, Lester Cleaver, Golden Leavitt, Vincent Skubal, Henry Day and Damon Savage.
