### K. Whipple Leaves For Naval Training At California Center

Kenneth Whipple, son of Mrs. Edith Whipple of Nyssa, left Jan. 19 for 80 days' recruit training at the U.S. Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

Whipple is a member of Surface Division 13-1, U.S. Naval Reserve in Boise, and drills with the unit every Wednesday evening. Commander Gene Stunz of Nyssa is commanding officer of the group.

Upon completion of his recruit training Whipple will be promoted to seaman apprentice, will be well on his way toward his seaman rank and will be eligible for one of the Navy's Class A schools when he goes on active duty.

Commander Stunz says that the 80-day recruit program is new in the Naval Reserve and is available to high school students, particularly juniors.

Young men may enlist in the Naval Reserve now, receive recruit training between their junior and senior years and attain the rating of seaman or possibly third class petty officer when they go on active duty for two years after graduation. This also solves the problem of summer jobs as the youths receive full pay for drills and training duty.
