Elmo Smith Files For Republican Committee Post

Elmo Smith, former Oregon Republican governor and legislative leader, announced today that he will file his candidacy for Republican national committeeman in Salem Monday morning.

The Albany publisher said he is seeking the post in response to requests from Republicans throughout the state who feel that through his background of public service to the state and political service to the party, he can increase the effectiveness of Oregon Republicans on a national level.

Smith was slated to seek the committeeman post in 1960, but abandoned this plan when he was drafted to carry the party standard in the U.S. Senate race.

Smith is publisher of the Albany Democrat-Herald and has interests in four weeklies in the state. "I have good contacts with many communities throughout the state," he said, "which keep me up to date with the needs and sentiments in all sections."

"I believe my previous political and public service will assist in strengthening the party image at the national level and will help strengthen the state organization as well. I have never been involved in party factions, but have friends in all camps. I am also filing for delegate-at-large to the Republican national convention," Smith said, concluding, "This will be my third national convention as a participant."

Smith is well-known in Nyssa and Malheur county. He was graduated from College of Idaho in 1933, owned the Ontario paper from 1936 to 1947, served as Ontario mayor eight years and was state governor in 1956-57.

"The Gypsies" by Jean Paul Clebert. A comprehensive study of the social, religious and economic customs and the general living patterns of gypsies throughout the world.

"The Lovely Sergeant" by Alan Burgess. The true story of Flora Sandes, pretty young English girl who served heroically as a nurse and front-line soldier through some of the bloodiest fighting of World War I.

"Ways With Art" by Harold Stevens. Fifty techniques for teaching children.

"Operation America" by Jules Dubois. The inside story of the Communist plan to subvert Latin America.

"The New Wilderness" by Willard E. Wilkes. A clearly written popular treatment of various aspects of space flight and space exploration.

"Contemporary American Painting and Sculpture" by University of Illinois. A catalogue of contemporary American painting and sculpture with brief biographical sketches of each of the 162 artists represented.

"The Search for Being" edited by Jean T. Wilde. Hoping to acquaint English-speaking readers with the outstanding French and German existentialists, the editors offer a perspective of 150 years of thought of that philosophical school.

"The Artist" by Jan de Hartog. The story of a man who had two ambitions in life—to be an artist and to follow the sea.

"The Month of Falling Leaves" by Bruce Marshall. A novel about a philosopher who was mistaken for a spy.

"Conflict in the Shadows" by James Eliot Cross. The nature and politics of guerilla war.
