fall 1964 was very important to the agriculture of this area and should be considered by action being taken by the chamber.

He explained that "braceros" (Mexican laborers) were not used here but were brought across the border for use in the southwestern states for field labor. In this area nationals are brought in from these same states, he said, and cutting off the foreigners would affect this area's labor supply.

He noted that last year Amalgamated arranged for approximately 1200 laborers to be brought here for field labor.

Vote on Issue Delayed

Paul Ludlow, local Methodist minister, said he felt that the chamber should table a vote on this until the other side of the issue could be presented and not just "railroad" it through.

Wilton Jackson said he would like further study made and find how many Mexican families were on government relief rolls in the six states affected.

The matter was tabled with an invitation to Ludlow to find a person qualified to present the other side. He said he felt he could do this within the next two weeks.

No Action on Medicare

"Medicare" for persons over 65 years of age.

He said the Kerr-Mills bill provided all the law that was necessary, that it was in use in all 50 states and was the basis for care of the needy aged in 36 states. It provides, he said, only care for those unable to afford it, where by the King-Anderson bill made it compulsory for all as provided under social security.

He said this was a form of socialism and the next step would be for the government to completely take over the practice of medicine.

Questions Political Issues

Ludlow again took the floor opposing the chamber taking any action, saying there were some in favor of medicare and the group should not become a pressure group. He said he felt that politics was not in the chamber field.

Chairman Ford answered that he felt that anything that directly affected the welfare of the group, town and community was within the chamber's field and should be considered.

No action was taken and Gene Stunz, legislative chairman, was asked to obtain a copy of the bill, study it and report back to the group at an early date.
