Ag Department Men Check Measurement Devices in County

Weights and measures men of the Oregon Department of Agriculture checked a total of 880 scales, service station pumps and meters in Malheur county during 1963.

In their checks of these measuring devices, inspectors condemned 75 for inaccurate weights or measurements. After being repaired, however, they are rechecked and sealed by the state. The state seal is the sign of accuracy of those scales and meters tested.

These inspections in Malheur county included 274 small scales ranging up to 399 pounds; 166 medium scales in the 400 to 7500-pound class; 88 stock or vehicle scales of from 7501 to 60,000-pound capacity; 14 vehicle or grain hopper scales in the more than 60,000-pound class; 268 service station pumps and 70 meters, including 20 liquid petroleum gas liquid meters.

The department's figures on weights and measures work in 1963 show a total of 37,653 inspections made statewide with 1569 condemnations. In 1962 checks were made on 35,848 measuring devices and total condemnations numbered 1404.

Stephen Submits Story of Jan. 1 'Ice-Bowl' Game

Following is an account of the Jan. 1, 1964, "Ice Bowl" game as submitted by Ronald Stephen who is with the U.S. Weather Bureau at Byrd station, Antarctica.

This peaceful station, high on the South Polar ice cap was the scene today of a football classic that rivals more famous bowl games for color and competition.

It was the fourth annual "Ice Bowl" game in which the U.S. Navy's Byrd station Maulers of Antarctic support activities shut out the U.S. Antarctic Research Project's civilian scientists 14-0.

The game was played under cloudless skies, with no wind, at a balmy zero degrees. Bright sunshine reflected from the snow surface was thoroughly warming.

Navy won the toss and elected to receive. The opponents battled scoreless to the end of the first quarter. Early in the second quarter, Navy intercepted a pass, setting up the first TD.

A pass for extra points was incomplete. Soon after Navy kicked off, the USARPs were forced to punt. The punt was blocked and recovered in the end zone for the second Navy score. A Navy end-run scored the extra two points.

During the second half, both teams tightened their defenses and held each other scoreless.

Final score was Navy 14 and USARP 0. The game was played by eight-man teams, with modified tackle rules, on a freshly dragged snow field marked off in black ink and with bamboo goal posts.

There were no injuries and play was marked by a striking spirit of sportsmanship.
