Mr. Chesney succumbed last Wednesday evening, Feb. 5, at his home following an extended illness.

He was born Oct. 23, 1894, near Fairbury, Neb., the youngest child of Emsley and Eva Benjamin Chesney. He grew up in Nebraska and also attended schools in that state.

On May 20, 1920, he was united in marriage to Susan Seibert of Superior, Neb. The family moved to the Fruitland, Idaho, area in 1935 and in 1944 moved to the Nu Acres community. The Chesneys came to Nyssa approximately a year ago where they had since resided. Until his retirement, the deceased had been a farmer.

In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. Chesney is survived by one son, Don of San Francisco; two daughters, Mrs. Donna Daudt of Jordan Valley and Mrs. Deane Kohl of Nyssa.

Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Harry Larson of New Plymouth, Mrs. Gertrude Blackstone of Superior, Neb., and five grandchildren. His parents, nine brothers and sisters preceded him in death. One son, Herbert, succumbed in 1925 at the age of 2½ years.
