

## Variety of Volumes Added to Shelves For Circulation at Nyssa City Library

City Librarian Joy Bell has released the following list of books recently added to the shelves of Nyssa public library:

### ADULT READING

"Miss Clare Remembers" by Miss Read. In this book, Miss Read tells the story of Miss Clare's long life, most of it spent in teaching at Fairacre school. Miss Clare looks back across six reigns and two world wars, in one of which she lost her lover. She surveys a quiet life which, for all its outward serenity, has personal drama. Her rural lifetime spanned a social revolution in the countryside.

"Lord of the Flies" by William Golding. A triumph of sheer narrative art, this book conveys its profundity entirely through the sensory and emotional impact of vivid story telling. The adventure of Golding's young boys — stranded on a coral island while the rest of the world is being destroyed — stimulates almost unbearable suspense and terror.

"Highway to the Wilderness" by Walter Bacon. A place that attracts most men is Lapland, above the Arctic circle. Here lies the fascinating country of endless nights and endless days, of cold and warmth, of snow and flowers, of solitude and men. In this intriguing and challenging, land devastated by war, an English electronics engineer, driven by restlessness, lived for three years with his wife and child.

"Out-Island Doctor" by Evans W. Cottman. One of the most unusual and remarkable autobiographies ever written, this is the colorful story of a man who left the dull security of a small mid-western town to carve out for himself a new adventurous life in a chain of exotic islands in the Caribbean.

"All Creatures Great and Small" by Daniel P. Mannix. An original, funny and delightfully informative book by one of the most engaging authors ever to write about animals, this is the story of a boy's discovery and rediscovery of pets—in a wide and astonishing assortment—as he grew into manhood. Daniel P. Mannix tells these personal tales about the remarkable understandings and friendships that flourish between different members of the animal kingdom, and he has written a book that will have the greatest appeal to anyone who has owned a pet of any kind or longed for one beyond the more accepted species.

"Nutrition for Your Family" by Better Homes and Gardens. Of all the activities of your busy day, planning meals probably takes as much time as anything you do. Naturally, you want your meals to be appealing and well-balanced. You want them to satisfy your family's likes and dislikes in foods. Preparing meals that do both requires originality and skill.

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## Henry Moore Receives Jaycee Award As Outstanding Young Man for 1963

Henry E. (Hank) Moore, Jr., was recently selected as "outstanding young man" of Indio and Coachella valley, Calif., for 1963, according to a news release by Thomas R. Burgin, Indio Jaycee president.

Moore, 34, is a son of the late Rev. Henry E. Moore and Mrs. Marie Moore of Adrian. He was graduated from Adrian Union high school in 1948 and from the College of Idaho at Caldwell in 1956. He has been a teacher in Indio elementary school district since September 1956.

He joined the Indio Jaycees that year and has been active in the organization, other community activities, the Elks lodge and the PTA.

He served as Jaycee president in 1961-62 and led Indio to its second Giessenbier award as the outstanding local organization in District II in cities having a population between 5,000 and 15,000. That same year he was recognized by the California Junior Chamber as one of nine outstanding local presidents.

### Named "Key Man"

In 1962-63 his interest in the Jaycee organization led him to be chosen locally as the "key man."

He has served as chairman for many Jaycee projects during his eight years as a member. In July 1963, upon returning from his third National Jaycee convention held in Louisville, Ky., he pointed out that the Indio Jaycees were very weak in international relations and switched his main interests to the local area.

He conceived the idea and co-chairmaned a project "Operation ComPadre with the cooperation of Jaycees in Mexicali, Baja California, Mexico, the American consulate and the immigration department, at which time 65 students and 10 teachers were transported 110 miles via buses to visit Indio schools for a day.

During one of his visits to Mexicali, it was pointed out the dire need for any type of school desks. He originated and was co-chairman of a project called "Operation Mesbanco (school desks)" in which 200 surplus desks, approximately 100 primary chairs and other school equipment were delivered to the Mexicali Jaycees for distribution.

## Oregon State University Specialist Reviews Retirement Goals for Aged

Retirement should not be an end, but a time for continued growth and for activities which satisfy the individual and society. The man who retires today at 65 has approximately 50,000 hours of free time ahead, on the average.

This is the way Mrs. Ada Stough, specialist on aging with the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, viewed the concept of "creative aging" when she visited Oregon State university last week.

Her comments are of particular interest to Oregon, where it is estimated that one out of 10 persons is 65 years or older. By 1970 the over 65 population in the state is expected to increase some 21 percent to an estimated 223,000 persons.

### Average Incomes Given

The 1960 census showed that the median annual income for Oregon adults in the 65-74 age bracket was \$2102 for men and \$863 for women. In the 75 and over group it was \$1323 for men and \$830 for women.

Society, faced with a large number of older persons, has been concentrating on the short-range problems of the aged — low income, health and adequate housing, Mrs. Stough believes. But only little has been done on the long-range problem of preparing the individual for the day when he retires, she maintains.

The individual has the responsibility for fully developing his potential and cannot expect society to do it for him. However, society must give him stimulation, encouragement and opportunities, she stressed.

### Encourage Individual Growth

The reservoir of functional and creative manpower among the elderly could be significant in years to come if churches, schools and other segments of society could better encourage the growth of individual potential.

"It is incumbent upon society to help keep man eager and receptive to life until its inevitable end," she said. "Inner strength and broad interests should motivate individuals to find meaningful avenues of self-fulfillment outside their paid jobs."
