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HOW DO YOU KEEP A CONCRETE FLOOR CLEAN?

If it always seems dusty, use a floor sealer made specially for concrete. Your local concrete products dealer probably has this.

If the floor is badly pitted and seems to develop even more pitting, the cement may be poor quality. Repouring may be the only answer.

You can put down asphalt or vinyl asbestos tile over concrete but you have to have a smooth surface or the flooring will not stay down.

Orange Cream Frosting is made by mixing together three tablespoons butter with 1 1/4 cup of powdered sugar and blending in three tablespoons sour cream, two tablespoons orange juice, 1/4 teaspoon vanilla and a pinch of salt.

EVER HAVE A SWEATER STRETCH?

Recently when we were at the cleaners, a lady was asking the girl behind the counter if anything could be done about her sweater. She had washed it at home and now one sleeve was longer than the other.

We couldn't resist intruding to ask if the sweater was made of acrylic man-made fiber. The woman looked at the label and discovered this to be true—and also noticed that the sweater came from a large store. Immediately the woman said she would take it back, because she knew they were reliable.

However, this wasn't necessary. Man-made fibers are excellent for sweaters but some (not all) acrylics stretch easily if not properly handled. The sweaters go back to the original size when dried in a dryer.

If you don't have a dryer, handle the garment carefully when washing, scoop both hands under it to squeeze out water. Don't pull it. Then dry on a flat surface.

Chocolate Melting Tip . . .

Did you ever melt one square of chocolate and think you would never get it out of the pot so you could use it? Butter the pot a little first and it will pour out quickly. Do the same when measuring molasses or Karo syrup.

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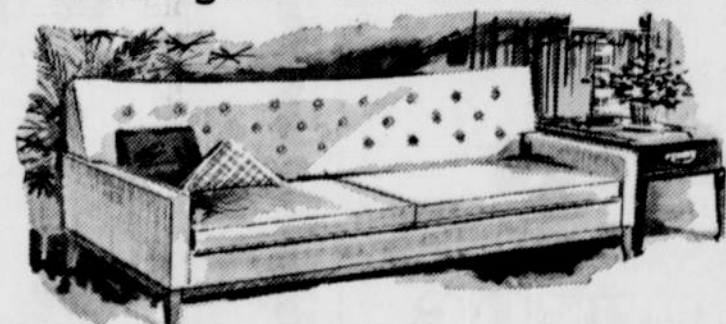
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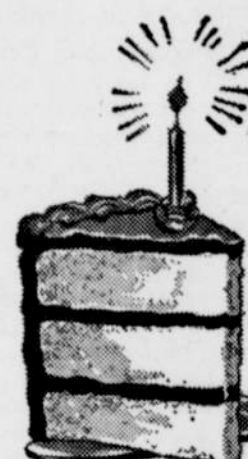
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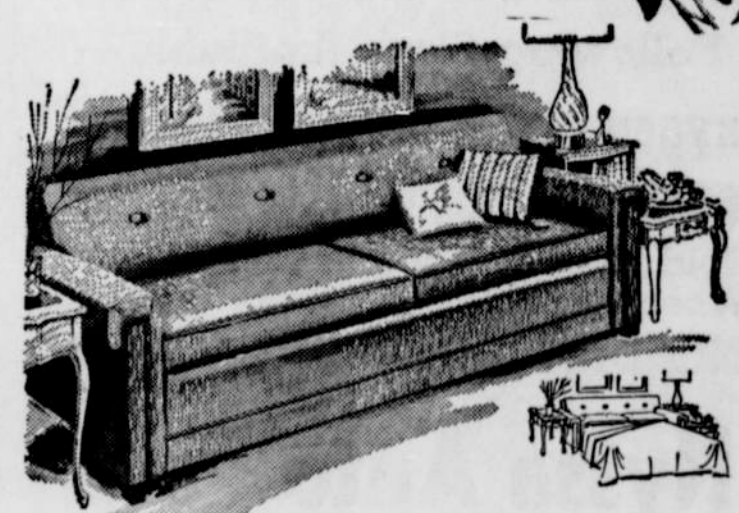
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
