... To Take Medical Course

Jesse K. Kygar, son of Mr. and Mrs. John K. Kygar of Nyssa, recently volunteered for three years service in the Regular Army and was flown by commercial aircraft to Ft. Ord, Calif., where he began his military career with eight weeks of basic training.

After completion of his mandatory training, Kygar will enter the Medical Repair Equipment school, according to Sgt. First Class Joseph M. Amick of Ontario.

The recruiter further stated that Kygar left for Ft. Ord with a written guarantee of his attendance at the Army's Medical course after he completes basic training. This is part of the Army's "Graduate Specialist Program" and it permits qualified high school graduates, who enlist for the Regular Army, the privilege of selecting any one of the 107 technical courses available for high school graduates who can qualify.

This selection and the written guarantee are all made before enlistment, Amick concluded.

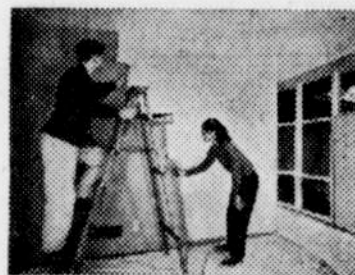

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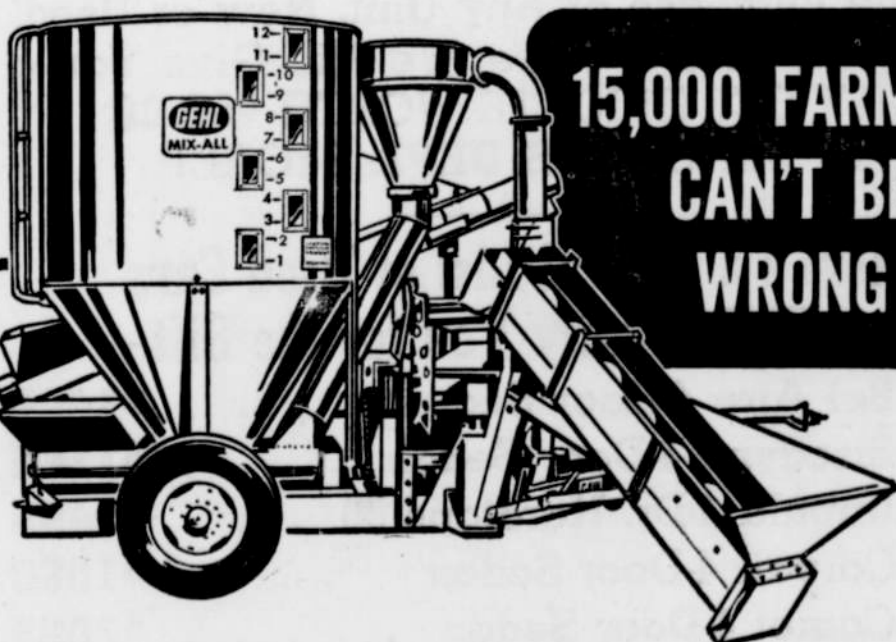
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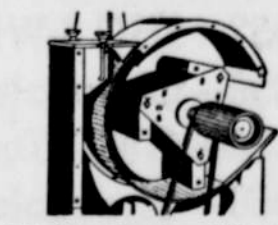
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
