

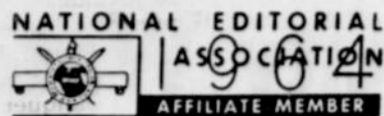

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## Democracy in Action

The Ontario Chamber of Commerce did a "bang-up" job of sponsoring the public appearance of Republican Nelson Rockefeller who aspires to become president of the United States.

It was done on a non-partisan basis after the Republican central committee of the county found no one who wished to sponsor the candidate's appearance. And, according to reports from the chairman of the event, there were no sour notes among chamber members.

As a result, Ontario got nationwide publicity. They also received an invitation to sponsor the appearance of Republican candidate Barry Goldwater whose supporters wished him to make an appearance there. They agreed to do so on the same basis as was done for Rockefeller. This included a \$1 charge for those attending his appearance at the Ontario high school with proceeds going to the local school band uniform fund.

The Citizens for Goldwater committee, in organizing Tuesday night in Ontario, desired that there be no charge for the address by Goldwater. When Ben Cook, representing the Ontario chamber, explained the position that made it mandatory for the same treatment of both candidates, the body decided to sponsor the Ontario appearance.

Cook assured the group they would get the cooperation of the chamber and the people of Ontario.

## 250 Petition Signers Ask for Fire District

To the Editor:

In reply to the letter of Mr. A. D. Moses to the editor, I would like to point out, for Mr. Moses' information, that the proposed Adrian Fire district is not just a dream of a so-called "Adrian brain trust," but the dream of over 250 petition signers and that the petitions were started by the Adrian Lions club only after the club was requested to do so by farmers in the area.

In soliciting for signatures, the Lions club found only two who refused to sign; perhaps Mr. Moses was one of these, the other being a person on the extreme edge of the district. So with this kind of support, the petitions were submitted to the county court.

Now if an intelligent person will but analyze the situation, he will find several reasons for supporting such a fire district. First, and foremost, the favorable effect on insurance rates when the district is properly formed.

Second, the feeling that there is some protection for the biggest business in the area: the Adrian Public Schools, valued at \$750,000.00. Third, it will provide some assurance that there will be help on any fire in the district. We may not save the primary fire, but will save thousands in secondary property and equipment.

I am certain that the good solid voters will back up the petition of wanting this fire district.

## IT'S YOUR LAW

## Lawyers Cooperate With Juvenile Courts

The legislature has given a youngster the right to counsel in juvenile court.

A youngster under 18 who has done some wrong may come before a juvenile court. It decides what is best for him. The hearing is civil—not criminal—and he is not punishable like an adult offender.

The juvenile court tries to keep its hearings informal and encourages the youth or his parents to discuss the case, thus the better to serve the youth and his community.

To see that the youth gets his rights, the court must also see that he and his parents know his rights. Thus, even though the court does not regard the youth's case as criminal, other people may do so. The military, future employers or schools may ask to see his record. His lawyer may have to see that the court conducts the hearings to protect his young client.

As a rule, the youth's probation officer works closely with the lawyer. As an officer of the court, the lawyer has also the duty to help to supervise and rehabilitate the youth who is a ward of the court. Since the lawyer often has the confidence of the parents and the youth, he may do much to help the young offender.

The district attorney himself seldom appears in juvenile court except as an observer, even when the youth has done some serious wrong.

The juvenile court aims mainly to help the youth get back on his feet rather than to convict and punish him. In the same spirit, his lawyer acts less as an advocate and more as an officer of the court.

(Oregon lawyers offer this column as a public service. No person should apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney, who is completely advised of the facts involved. Even a slight variance in facts may change the application of the law.)
