ADULT READING

"The Moon-Spinners" by Mary Stewart. One Mark Langley, an assured young Englishman who for bizarre but all to credible reasons was hiding out in the hills. He was less than pleased to have been discovered—and by a determined female, at that—and sent Nicola packing with the order to keep out of his affairs. This, of course, Nicola was unable to do, and . . .

"Wind From the Carolinas" by Robert Wilder. This book tells the story of how the wealthy aristocratic families from Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia, who, after the American Revolution, remained loyal to King and Crown, abandoned their plantations and established new dynasties in the friendlier climate of the Bahamas.

"Molokai" by O. A. Bushnell. Only three men ever chose to go to Molokai. One, a priest, brought compassion and the hope of salvation. The second, a doctor, for the sake of humanity, was prepared to perform a monstrous experiment on human life. The third was Keanu, whom you will remember as long as you live.

"Joy in the Morning" by Betty Smith (author of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn"). Once upon a time a boy and a girl met in Brooklyn, N.Y., and fell in love. The boy

went on to a midwest university to study law and the girl, who was only 18, traveled alone from Brooklyn to marry him. They were poor as well as young, but they were determined to make something wonderful of their life together. And they did.

"A Day in the Life of President Kennedy" by Jim Bishop. Tells how each hour of a particular day was spent by the President, Mrs. Kennedy, the children and office and domestic White House staff. The day begins at 7 a.m. and ends with his retirement at midnight.

"A Little to the East" by Robert Cenedella. Joe Monti is a successful small-town lawyer, and Martin McQuaid, Joe's client, has pleaded guilty to first-degree murder. Outwardly the two have little in common. Martin had killed his wife in a sudden break with the conformity that had always governed his actions. Joe, frightened by his secret knowledge that he is dying of leukemia, is shocked by Martin's indifference to death.

"The Rodgers and Hammerstein Story" by Stanley Green. The result of their working together is a warm, well-rounded explanation of the personalities and working techniques of Rodgers and Hammerstein—two men whose reputation for combining their very different talents made their names almost a single word throughout the world.

"Bible Words That Guide Me" by Hubert A. Elliott. The Holy Bible is an inexhaustible source of riches for the mind and spirit of man. Area Irrigation Water Supply Ample For 1964 Crops; Increased Streamflow To Make Up for Reservoir Shortages

Water Content 102% of April 1 Average;
Snow Cover Four Times Greater in Owyhee

The 1964 irrigation season is opening in Malheur county with an adequate water supply outlook for all usual agricultural operations, according to a report released this week by T. P. Helseth, state conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service (USDA), cooperating with Oregon State university, Oregon state engineer and others. The long-delayed spring break-up began in late March releasing streams that had been ice-bound all winter.

Reservoir water supplies are still below average but not so far below last year but what expected streamflow will make up the shortages.

Water content of the mountain snowpack is 102 percent of the April 1 average on the Owyhee watersheds and 103 percent average on the Malheur. Compared with last year there is four times as much snow on the Owyhee this year and 10 times as much on the Malheur.

Very Heavy Runoff Seen

Most of the six to 24 inches of snow, reported from aerial observations in late January, on the many hundreds of square miles of the Owyhee plateau region was still present on April 1 and is now contributing heavily to present runoff into the Owyhee river. A rapid melt of this snow will cause a very heavy runoff.

Moisture in the soils under the snowpack is quite satisfactory and now stands at 81 percent of capacity on the Owyhee and 76 percent on the Malheur.

Storage in Lake Owyhee reservoir on April 1 was 362,890 acre feet which is exactly the figure for that date a year ago. Although this figure is considerably less than average for this date, the reservoir is already receiving the early portion of what prom-

ises to be an excellent runoff this season.

Jordan Valley Shortage Possible

Antelope reservoir held 10,076 acre feet on April 1 and Jordan Valley Irrigation district needs about 35,000 for a good season. There may be some shortages.

As of April 1, Wamsprings and Agency Valley reservoirs held 71,500 and 31,685 acre feet, respectively, compared with 83,800 and 42,400 acre feet just one year ago. These amounts are well below the average but will be sufficient when coupled with runoff still expected.

Forecast for inflow to Lake Owyhee April through July is 385,000 acre feet or 93 percent of average. This flow could be substantially greater if a rapid snow melt show occur.

Malheur River Near Average

Flow of the Malheur river near Drewsey is forecast at 69,000 acre feet or 86 percent average for April through July. For the same period the Malheur North Fork is forecast at 55,000 acre feet or 93 percent average.

Statewide, the water supply outlook for the 1964 Oregon irrigation season is adequate for nearly all lands. A major exception is the area served from McKay reservoir near Pendleton and from Antelope reservoir near Jordan Valley where stored water is much below average and some shortages are expected.
