Mrs. Cook Receives More News of Quake From Kin in Alaska

Additional word regarding the recent earthquake was received by Mrs. Angie Cook Monday in a letter written April 8 by her daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Davis of Spenard, Alaska.

She said that they were certainly worried about survival during the quake as the roads and bridges were out in both directions from Spenard, the international airport was wrecked, airplanes could not get in or out and they were isolated without heat or lights.

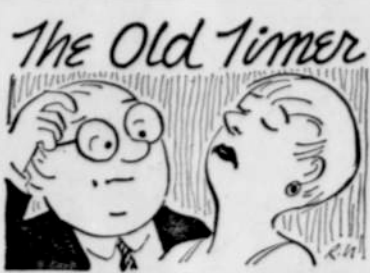
Their food supply was limited. They had gathered survival provisions during the Cuban crisis or they wouldn't have had much foodstuff on hand.

Mrs. Davis stated that the military and Salvation Army started things working as soon as possible. There are still approximately 600 homeless and they are being housed in school houses and old barracks buildings.

There are many people who have nothing left, not even loved ones. The death toll will not be known for many weeks, Mrs. Davis said.

One of the Davis' doctor friends saw the earth open up and swallow his oldest and youngest sons and only one of the bodies has been recovered.

Just the day before her letter was written, Mrs. Davis said an unusual thing happened on the street named Oregon drive in Spenard. At one end of the street is a gully between 14 and 20 feet deep. That afternoon the bottom of the gully started bubbling up

so rapidly that people became afraid and called the military.

Guards were posted around the area to keep everyone away and in one hour the "thing" had grown 2½ feet high, looking like a giant mushroom, except that it was the earth itself. The growth continued for a while then slowed.

Early the next morning the top cracked and water started bubbling out. Last reports were that it was still continuing to grow.

Mrs. Davis said it would take months to get their house cleaned and in order. Glass is embedded in everything, including the carpets.

Then she added, "We are so fortunate; time and money can replace what we lost. If we can't afford to replace those things, then we will do without and be grateful that our lives were spared."
