

Books on Modern Guerrilla Fighting Head List at Malheur County Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, April 25, at Malheur county library include the following:

"Guerrilla" by Charles W. Thayer. A discussion of guerrilla tactics, with specific incidents cited and an analysis of why guerrilla units can often overcome their more organized and highly trained adversaries.

"They Fought Alone" by John Keats. An account of guerrilla action carried out under American Colonel Wendell W. Fertig on the Philippine island of Mindanao during World War II.

"Runaway to Heaven" by Johanna Johnston. The story of Harriet Beecher Stowe and her era.

"Furs by Astor" by John Upton Terrell. The story of John Jacob Astor and the founding of a great American fortune.

"Freedom of the Mind" by William O. Douglas. Covers also freedom of speech, communication and censorship.

"Literature and Science" by Aldous Huxley. Inquiry into the possible solution to the existing conflict between the world of science and the world of human experience.

"Radiation, Genes and Man" by Bruce Wallace. Biological aspects of radiation hazards.

"Corporations in Crisis" by Richard Austin Smith. Articles previously published in Fortune magazine crisply recount problems of growth, responsibility, control, leadership, competition and judgment as they occurred in specific corporations.

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"Four Days" by American Heritage. The historical record of the death of President Kennedy.

"Pictorial Guide to the Moon" by Dinsmore Alter. The author presents his accumulated knowledge along with more than 100 black-and-white photographs.

"Horses and Their Bosses" by Bill Ballantine. Stories of horses who earn their living in a variety of ways from working in the movies to pulling beer wagons.

"The Martyred" by Richard E. Kim. Of 14 Christian missionaries captured by the ROK Army in Korea, 12 were slaughtered.

The investigations into why two were spared leads through the convolutions of the human spirit and of the relationship of man to his God.

"Lady on the Coin" by Margaret Campbell Barnes. A historical novel of the time of Charles II.

"American Education: A National Failure" by H. G. Rickover. The author points out the weaknesses in the American system of education and suggests reforms based on the English system.

"The Jew in American Life" by Samuel H. Dresner. A book rich in insights and readability, on subjects important to Jewish readers, but applicable to the general, non-Jewish reader as well.

"A Primer on Government Spending" by Robert L. Heilbroner. A study of deficit government spending.

"The Alderson Story" by Elizabeth Gurley Flynn. This human story of a woman's prison describes factually rather than emotionally the inmates and conditions at Federal Reformatory for Women, Alderson, W. Va.

"Anastasia: The Autobiography of H. I. H. the Grand Duchess Anastasia Nikolaevna of Russia." An account by a new claimant who is an American citizen currently living in New York.

"The Reptiles" by Archie Carr. Another volume of the "Life Nature Library."

"Navaho Trading Days" by Elizabeth Compton Hegemann. Inside information about the Hopis, Navahos, traders and tourists of

Nyssa Chapel Rites Held Wednesday For Sytje Timmerman

Funeral services for Mrs. John (Sytje) Timmerman were conducted Wednesday afternoon, April 22, 1964, at Lienkaemper chapel in Nyssa. Officiating minister was the Rev. Elmer Rosenkilde, pastor of the Community Presbyterian church in Adrian. Mrs. Timmerman succumbed Saturday at her home on Mendiola road west of Adrian, following an extended illness.

She was born Sept. 1, 1899, in Schellinkhout, Holland, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johannes Stam. She came to America in 1905 and resided with her family in the Oregon Trail community. In 1919 she was united in marriage to John Timmerman. They moved to the Big Bend area in 1930 and six years later homesteaded on new land under the Owyhee irrigation project in the Newell Heights community where they had since resided.

In addition to Mr. Timmerman, the deceased is survived by two sons, Gerrit of the Newell Heights area near Adrian and John, Jr. of Jordan Valley.

Other survivors include three brothers, Luit, Gerrit and Klaas Stam, all of rural Nyssa. Eleven grandchildren also survive. One son, Pete, preceded his mother in death in February 1963.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Pallbearers were Carl B. Hill, George Schiemer, Maurice L. Judd, Klaas Laan, Klass Hart and George Smit.

Cattlemen and Veterinarians of State Ask Study of Disease Affecting Calves

Young calves on Eastern Oregon ranches have been hit again this year by a disease entity manifested by a diarrhea.

Severe losses that have already occurred have prompted cattlemen and the Oregon Department of Agriculture to renew the request for assistance from the National Animal Disease Laboratory at Ames, Iowa, in determining the cause of the disease.

Dr. G. B. VanNess, veterinarian with the bacterial disease surveillance and field assistance division of the laboratory, did some work with the disease last year and is in Oregon again.

Along with Dr. Glenn B. Rea, state veterinarian, Oregon Department of Agriculture, and Dr. A. G. Beagle, federal veterinarian in charge in Oregon, he will meet with cattlemen Thursday evening, March 5, at Baker.

Federal Vets Contacted

Dr. Donald Miller, assistant director of the animal disease eradication division, USDA, met in Salem last week with federal and state veterinarians to discuss the problem.

Miller said no funds were readily available for a study of the disease but his division will start meetings in Washington, D.C., this week to review the technical aspects of the problem and discuss possibilities of financing a study. He said he did not think the answer would be found in a short investigation.

Noting that there was a feeling on the part of some that this disease was not the same as the typical calf scour, Dr. Miller pointed out that there seems to be more than one factor involved and scours are just a symptom of the disease.

Answer to Problem Not Found

The cattle industry, state, federal and private veterinarians worked on the problem last year and asked assistance from the laboratory at Ames after they had exhausted their resources and not found the answer to the problem.

The meeting is being called so cattlemen and veterinarians may draft a plan of procedure for study to present to the animal disease eradication division of the USDA.

Miller said his division would cooperate to the limit of funds available because they recognized the problem and feel help is needed.

Losses Over \$4 Million Reported

He said cattlemen told him they first began suffering heavy losses in 1954 and figures supplied him by the cattlemen indicated losses of from 14 to 20 percent of the calves. The cattlemen's estimates of total market value of calves lost in 1954 and the years 1959-63 was \$4,216,290, he said.

The disease has been a problem in most of Eastern Oregon but heaviest losses have been suffered in Baker and Union counties.

Dr. Miller said a similar condition has also appeared among calves in Idaho.

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
