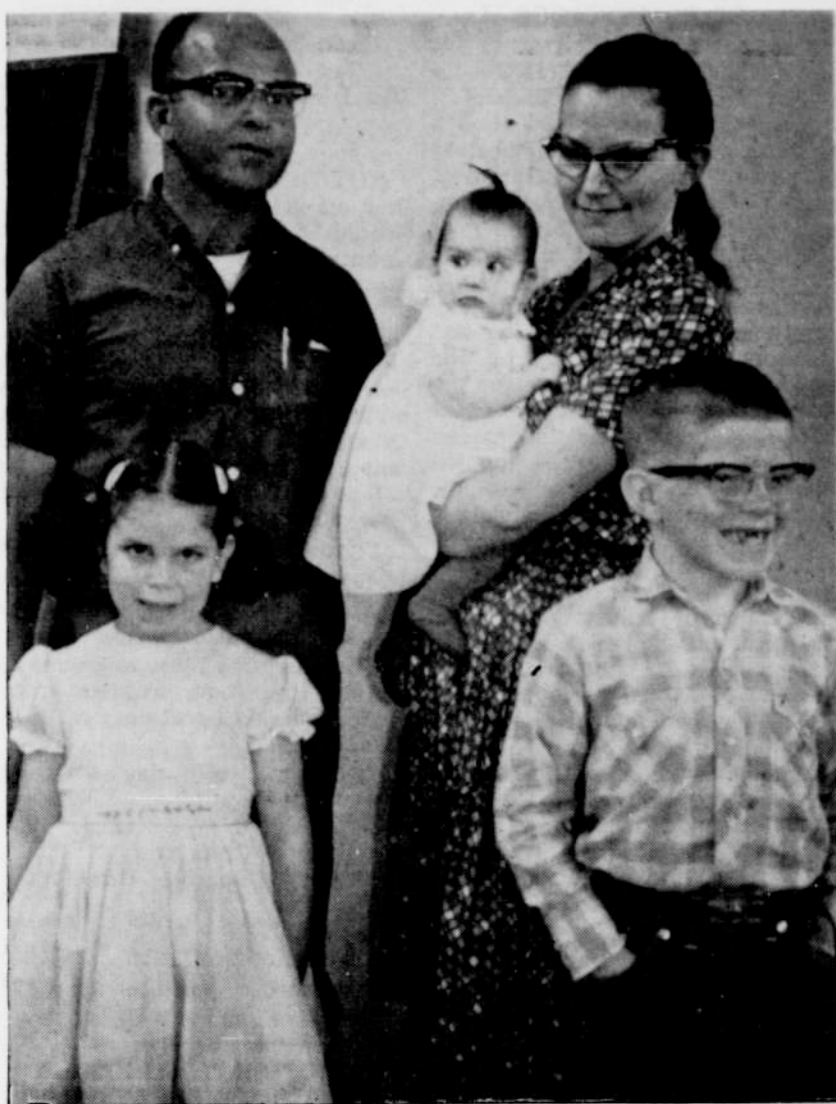

Report System for Use of Pesticides Being Introduced in Pacific Northwest

A system of uniform reporting of pesticides used on horticultural crops grown for processing and the fresh market is being introduced in the Pacific Northwest this year, reports R. W. Every, Oregon State university extension entomologist and member of the Northwest Committee on Uniform Crop Pesticide Records.

Uniform record keeping is another way of insuring the public a wholesome food supply, Every emphasizes, while giving the grower and buyer an accurate account of pesticides applied to both land and crops.

H. J. Shipman of Toppenish, Wash., committee chairman and entomologist, California Packing corporation, points out that there is a growing demand from buyers for a complete record of pesticides applied to each fresh market or processing crop.

Records Valuable to Many

Keeping uniform records can help inform growers about new regulations, timing and other vital matters in the use of pesticides as well as giving the grower an exact record of each crop and field over a period of years which will be valuable to him, the buyer, seller and consumer, Shipman noted.

The basic idea is to bring about uniformity in reporting usage of pesticides, Every explained. Most processors already require such reports from growers producing

under contract, but the style of reporting varies. Various record forms are also available from many agricultural chemical companies.

Other Crop Records Sought

In addition to growers producing horticultural crops, Every has hopes the uniform record keeping system will be adopted by others, including producers of potatoes, hay and forage crops.

The importance of keeping accurate records is increasing, Every stressed. In the future, he believes that buyers, to protect themselves from the possibility of illegal residue levels, will require a statement from growers as to the chemicals applied to both the land and crop.
