

Goldwater Promoted At Monday Breakfast

Stand on S.S. and U.N.

Mrs. Pallady said that Goldwater was not against social security but was opposed to it being mandatory. He feels that it should be a matter of personal choice.

Of the United Nations, he was not against it as originally set up but does think it not good that countries can outvote us and make decisions when they do not even pay their dues.

Mrs. Pallady introduced Mrs. Johnson, a native of Phoenix, Ariz., and a life-long friend of the Goldwater family.

Goldwater's background was given, including his education, business experience and his political growth as a Republican in an overwhelming Democrat state. Mrs. Johnson also described Mrs. Goldwater and the three children, all of whom are taking an active part in the campaign for the presidency.

Courageous Stands

Mrs. Johnson named occasions when Senator Goldwater had displayed rare courage in the senate as: (1) When he opposed the Kennedy-Ives labor bill (later replaced by the Landrum-Griffin bill). He was the only senator opposing the original bill at the beginning. (2) He was one of the few opposing the Test Ban treaty with Russia as he feels that the Communists only respect strength in armed might and that until our missiles have been completely tested we should continue to do so. (3) On Cuba, Mrs. Johnson said, Goldwater feels that Cubans in the U.S. should lead the movement to overthrow Castro and be given complete air cover by our forces.

Questions and Answers

In a question and answer session, according to Mrs. Johnson, Goldwater is for Civil Rights but is opposed to certain sections of the proposed bill. He feels that education should be controlled by the states and not the federal government. She did not know his position on Beef Import agreement but promised to find out and notify the questioner.

Eagle U.S. Emblem

In closing, the speaker compared the Oyster and the Eagle. She said when God made the Oyster he had a built-in home and to get food only had to open its mouth. When He made the Eagle He made it to fly through the air and hunt for its food in all kinds of weather.

"The Eagle, not the Oyster, is the emblem of the United States," she said.

Mrs. Jean (Pat) Bond states that her application for appointment of county treasurer was filled out with a heavy heart, as she deeply respected George Van Horn and cherished his friendship. She says she feels that she can best serve the people of Malheur county by helping to make the transition in the treasurer's office as efficient as possible by use of knowledge gained in her years as deputy tax collector and close association with the treasurer's office.

Immediately after her appointment she received a tax turnover from the sheriff and disbursed the money to the taxing districts. This could not have been accomplished so soon without her background of experience, Mrs. Bond notes.

In Charge of Tax Office

The treasurer's work is closely related to that of the tax office, of which she was in charge for 11 years. In the tax office she had set up numerous controls and office procedures to increase efficiency, thereby saving in costs of audits and supplies, keeping extra clerical help at a minimum, collecting unsecured personal property taxes and decreasing the amount of interest paid by the taxing districts on borrowed money by getting the tax turnover to the treasurer quickly.

The change also made available immediate tax information for budget boards, loan companies, bonding agencies, taxing districts, etc.

Mrs. Bond was born at White-son, Ore., in 1922, attended school 12 years at Malin and in 1940 moved to Vale with her parents. She has resided there ever since with the exception of three years during the war.

Experience Listed

She studied stenography with the LaSalle Extension university by correspondence. In 1941 Mrs. Bond worked as bookkeeper and stenographer for contractors who built Camp Adair. In 1951 she was with Walston, Gorton & Fowler, CPAs at Ontario. Aug. 1, 1952, was her first day with Malheur county as secretary and tax clerk for the sheriff. In April 1953 she became deputy tax collector and remained there until appointed county treasurer last December.

The candidate's husband, E. C. "Tug" Bond has been a mechanic at Kessler Chevrolet since 1945. He has been chief of the Vale Volunteer Fire department for three years. A daughter, Jane, was graduated from Vale high in 1961. She attended Oregon State university for almost two years and is now employed in Phoenix, Ariz. Terry, a son, was graduated from Vale high in 1963 and is now attending Oregon Technical institute.

Mrs. Bond was an active member of the Home Extension unit for 10 years and also a 4-H sewing leader for 10 years. Her participation in civic affairs in recent years has been curtailed because of time limitations due to duties as deputy tax collector, management of her home and responsibilities as a parent.

Idaho National Guard Recruiting Officer Plans Visit to Nyssa

M/Sgt. James R. Followill, with Nampa Headquarters Company 139th Engineer Battalion, Idaho National Guard, has asked the Journal to announce that he will be in Nyssa from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m. Saturday, May 2, at the council chambers in the city hall.

He stated that openings are available in both the headquarters and in company B of the National Guard units at Nampa.

Any man desiring to fulfill his military obligations may do so by joining one of these units, Followill said.

Upon enlistment or within 120 days, the enlistee will be sent for six weeks of basic training. He then enters a specialists' school to remain from two to four months and will not be absent from home for more than a six-month period, the officer stated.

Available to him in the specialty line of training will be welding, mechanics, diesel and automotive, heavy equipment operator, heavy or light truck driver, radio operator, machinist, clerical work, surveying, drafting, medical aid and others.

Also available to prior service men are schools to advance military knowledge and to receive promotions in the guard, as well as to benefit them in civilian employment, Followill concluded.
