Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

IF YOUR FAMILY IS TYPICAL

. . . you throw away money in the form of food, says Virginia Weiser, Oregon State university extension nutritionist. Research by three state universities shows that as much as 10 percent of the calories of food are discarded or fed to animals. This adds up to some 200 calories per person per day.

To save on food bills, avoid discards of edible parts of meats, poultry and fish. This is the biggest waste, say the researchers. Grain products and food fats and oils are next largest discards.

Don't buy more than you need and use what you buy!

CONCERNED ABOUT MONEY

. . . for your youngsters college education? College costs have more than doubled in the last 10 years. But if you plan in advance for their education you have a big assist working for you—time.

Alberta Johnston, OSU extension, family finance specialist, figures it this way—

If college costs of \$8000 are paid during the four years when the student is attending college, the cost would be \$167 a month. But if you set up a 10-year saving program and invest these savings at 3½ or 4 percent interest, you would only need to save about \$55 a month. Planning ahead pays off.

SLIP COVERS NEED FRESHENING?

. . . Wash and starch them in your automatic washer. Put them on furniture without ironing and while slightly damp. Stretch the seams and smooth flat surfaces.

An electric fan or hair dryer nearby can finish the drying after the slip cover is in place. For a final touch, use a whisk of spray starch on the pleated skirt. Then wrap a book in a towel to serve as a small ironing board for the ruffle touch-up.

SPRINGTIME IS PAINTING TIME

. . . But sometimes Junior wants to join in too. Mrs. Roberta Frazier, OSU extension family life specialist, suggests that you give him a pail of water and his very own brush.

He can "paint" the lawn furniture, fences and anything else that's water resistant.

Keep an eye on him, because he might try painting with mud. If this happens, put the brush away for awhile. Later give him another try, to see if he can remember.

ALUMINUM FOIL IN YOUR OVEN

. . . may be a time saver in cleaning. But take heed—if used incorrectly, damage can result.

Never cover an entire oven shelf with foil. This would cause uneven heat circulation. Foil can be used on the oven floor, but take extra care that it does not touch the heating element of an electric range.

The best way is to place a piece of foil on the shelf below the one used in baking to catch spillovers from casseroles or pies. Foil should be an inch or so larger than the pan above.
