

Plentiful Jobs, Salary Raises Noted For Grads by OSU Placement Officers

Jobs are more plentiful and starting salaries are higher than a year ago for the June college graduate, according to placement officers at Oregon State university.

Average starting salaries run from \$4,400 to \$7,200 a year for the June graduate with a bachelor's degree, depending upon the field of study. And with a master's or doctor's degree, the starting pay ranges from \$6,000 to \$13,000 a year.

Interviewers have come to the OSU campus in a steady stream this year, seeking out the more capable and qualified students. In engineering, some companies and state and federal agencies have already scheduled interview dates for 1965 graduates.

It adds up to a surplus of jobs and a shortage of capable people, campus placement officers reported. Within a few years a college graduate in the lower half of his class will have little more advantage in the job market than a high school graduate of today, according to one OSU placement officer.

Armed Services Claim Seniors

The armed services continue to claim a sizeable number of the graduating male seniors. Young men returning from the service have found themselves in lively demand for training programs in business.

The school-by-school outlook for OSU June graduates is as follows:

Science—In a typical science field, chemistry, the bachelor degree graduate can earn from \$6,600 to \$7,200 a year. With a master's degree in chemistry, physics, microbiology, mathematics and other science fields, the graduate can start at \$8,000. And with a doctor's degree, the pay can range from \$10,000 to \$13,000 a year.

Business and Technology—Average starting pay is \$490 per month, up about \$25 over last year. Industry has offered the top candidates up to \$700 a month. Several offers have been in the \$575 to \$625 range. Accounting is still the shortage field.

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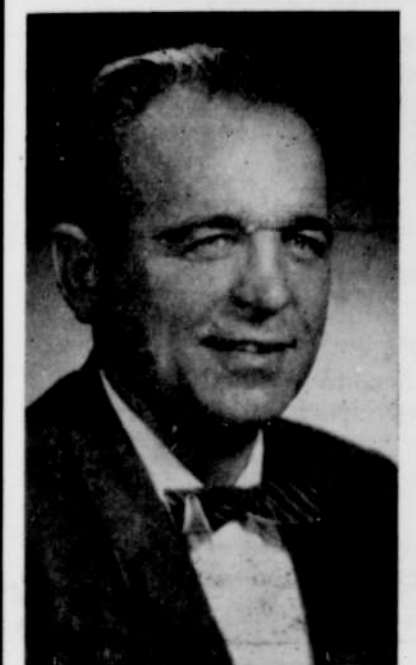

IFYE Housing Applications Available At Office of County Extension Agent

Application forms are now available for Malheur county farm families who wish to provide homes for visiting International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) delegates, according to Helen Dwell, county extension agent.

The International Farm Youth Exchange is a two-way exchange of rural young people. Each year over 100 delegates from the U.S. go abroad for up to six months and a similar number of exchangees come to this country. The participants live and share everyday experiences with families, gaining a better understanding of the life of their hosts by living it.

German Exchange in Nyssa

During the summer of 1962, Ellen Petersen, an IFYE exchangee from Germany, lived with the Grant Rinehart family at Nyssa.

Six exchangees have been assigned to Oregon for this summer. They include a girl from Korea,

a boy from Venezuela, a girl from Luxembourg, a boy from Italy, a girl from England/Wales and a boy from Israel. Oregon will receive two other exchangees who have not yet been assigned. All exchangees are between 20 and 30 years of age.

IFYE's will spend three to four weeks with each host family. They will have an opportunity to participate in community youth, farm, church and civic groups.

"One of the challenges to the host family is to let the IFYE be a member of the family and have family work and activities be as normal as possible. It is also a challenge to the IFYE to become a participating family member," Miss Dwell said.

Persons interested in applying to be IFYE host families should call the Malheur county extension office in Ontario immediately, the extension agent advised.

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
