Walter Reed Army Nursing Institute Being Established

A nursing institute has been established at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. Designated the Walter Reed Army Institute of Nursing, it will conduct a four-year nursing program leading to a baccalaureate degree.

A contract has been signed with the University of Maryland for supervision of the curriculum and other academic aspects of the program to include the awarding of the bachelor of science degree in nursing.

Beginning next September, young women and men selected to participate will be enlisted in the Army Reserve and receive the cost of tuition and books in addition to military pay. They will attend an accredited college or university of their choice during their freshman and sophomore years.

At the end of the second year students will be transferred to the Walter Reed Army Institute of Nursing. During this phase, students will matriculate at the University of Maryland and upon graduation will be awarded a BS degree in nursing.

Following graduation and licensing they will be commissioned second lieutenants in the Army Nurse corps, with an obligation to serve on active duty for at

Users of Pesticides Advised to Follow Full Directions Given on Containers

Pesticides used with proper care can be a farmer's or home gardener's best friend.

But, if directions are not followed and proper precautions taken, pesticides can be deadly and destructive.

Special care needs to be taken to see that these chemicals are kept out of the reach of children, pets and irresponsible persons, warns J. D. Patterson, chief chemist with the Oregon Department of Agriculture. And, he advises storing them safely in a locked cabinet, if possible.

Careless Practice Cited

One of the most careless practices of which home gardeners are guilty is the removal of these pesticides from the original container. Sometimes this container is a pop or other beverage bottle. These have a special attraction to children.

ken package of pesticide or pesticides removed from the original container and always use approved methods of disposing of the empty containers. There is often enough residue left in a container to cause serious illness or death.

Users of pesticides need to always remember that the directions on the label are prepared for their use and protection and to prevent damage to crops, orchards, gardens and shrubs on which the pesticide may be used.

Other Cautions Listed

Patterson points out that directions on pesticide labels are the result of much research on the part of the manufacturers of these chemicals and must always be carefully read.

Other reminders that Patterson has for the pesticide user's check list for safe use are:

Wear a mask and protective clothing when directed on the label.

Wash contaminated clothing before reuse.

Avoid smoking while using the pesticide.

Avoid spilling.

Wash hands after using.

Cover food and water containers in areas to be sprayed.

Be sure to use as directed so the crop on which it is used meets residue tolerances, if there is a residue.

In 1958 the Legislative session gave the County Treasurer power to invest idle funds in the treasurers' possessions in government securities.
