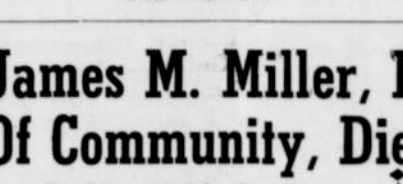

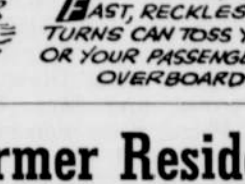

G—Give punctual and dependable attention to all responsibilities.

H—Help keep the grounds and building clean and orderly.

S—School and public property should be given proper care.

C—Conduct ourselves on school-sponsored trips in such a way as to reflect honor on Nyssa High.

H—Have high standards in behavior, thought, speech and dress.

O—Observe safety regulations.

O—Our school and team deserve our pride and loyalty.

L—Let us all conscientiously strive to maintain a pleasant and wholesome atmosphere in the cafeteria, halls and buses.

Student Body President Christy Wyckoff asks that "All students please be thinking on these two subjects. If you don't like our suggestions, please tell us, and if you have any suggestions of your own, please bring them up at the assembly. Remember, this code is not a set of rules that have to be followed; they are merely suggestions for your benefit."
