... Record of Public Service

John C. Elfering, well-known former Malheur county official, has filed for the Republican nomination as county clerk and is soliciting votes in the May 15 primary election.

Elfering has a long record of public service, having held the office of Malheur county sheriff for 12 years, from 1948 to 1960. It was during his first term as sheriff that mechanization of the tax collection department administered by the sheriff was achieved. Up to that time, tax collection had been done by long hand.

The complete conversion was accomplished with no interruption in the processing of tax monies and has resulted in one of the most efficient collection agencies in state and county governments.

During his last term as sheriff, he organized the successful county-wide and interstate police radio hookup which is in use at the present time.

Serves in Los Angeles

The candidate was born in California. He was graduated from high school in Torrance and attended UCLA in Los Angeles. He first came to Malheur county with his parents in 1933 when they purchased a farm near Vale. He went back to Los Angeles where he served as a deputy in the Los Angeles county Sheriff's department until 1944 when he returned to this county and engaged in farming until he was elected sheriff in 1948.

Mr. and Mrs. Elfering are the parents of six children. One daughter is married, another is finishing her second year in the University of Oregon Medical school and a married son will receive his degree this month from the University of Portland. They also have a son in high school and a boy and girl in grade school.

Primary Elections Set For Friday, May 15

The same information will apply to selecting two delegates from this Second Congressional district where there are 12 candidates.

Most voters have probably made up their minds which of the six presidential candidates will get their vote. Only Senator Goldwater, the conservative, and Governor Rockefeller, the liberal, have campaigned in the state.

In the district only one place is contested. Willard R. Cromwell and Everett J. Thoren seek the nomination for congressman from this district.

Statewide, McCall and Moseley are in the race for secretary of state.

Two County Contests

John C. Elfering, former county sheriff, and Margaret V. Tiffany are in the race for county clerk. Mrs. Tiffany served as an employee in the office for three years under Democratic incumbent J. Homer Schnell.

Jean "Pat" Bond and Marie Van Horn, both of Vale, are seeking the county treasurer office.

Mrs. Bond is present treasurer, serving by county court appointment following the death of Mr. Van Horn. Prior to the appointment, she served in the tax assessor's office.

Mrs. Van Horn, widow of the former treasurer, sought the appointment and is now making the race for it. She states that she is familiar with the duties of the office from having worked with her husband during his tenure in the office.

Democratic Party Ballot

This ballot follows the same order as the Republican ballot outlined above. Fourteen delegates at large will be selected from a list of 54 names to attend the national convention. Little choice is given the voter as practically all show they are strong for President Lyndon B. Johnson. Two delegates representing this congressional district will be chosen from four names on the ballot.

Statewide, only the offices of secretary of state and state treasurer are contested in the Democratic primary.

No contests are slated in the party for county offices. According to records from the county clerk's office a total of 8,723 voters are registered in Malheur county. Republicans number 4,483; Democrats, 4,107; Independents, 41; Nonpartisans, 92.
