In August 1963 he became vice president and manager of the East Bakersfield branch of the Greenfield State bank. This was his position at time of his death.

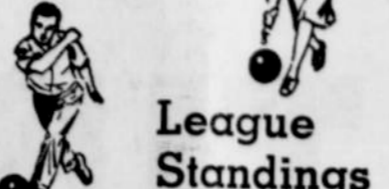

Interment was made in the Garden of Memory section of Greenlawn Memorial park in Bakersfield.

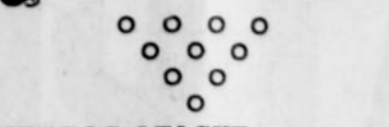
SENIOR CITIZENS TO MEET
