Electricity furnishes indirect lighting and power for the heating and cooling system. A pump heats the water from an outside well in winter and automatically reverses the operation for cooling during the summer months.  
Dr. Ross said the large animal section still lacks a loading chute, outside stalls and corrals—all of which will be completed in the near future.

With the all-new building, furnishings, equipment, residence telephones and two-way radios in all vehicles, the staff is capable of giving service second to none in the valley.

### LDS Funeral Services To Be Held Today For Frank Mitchell

Funeral services for Franklin Elmer Mitchell, 55, will be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, May 21, 1964, at the Owyhee LDS church with Bishop Wayne L. Berrett officiating.

Mr. Mitchell succumbed Monday at Malheur Memorial hospital following an extended illness. He was born Nov. 30, 1908, at Clinton, Utah, a son of Frederick and Ethel Steed Mitchell. He grew up in that area and on Dec. 18, 1929, was united in marriage to Cora Hill in the Salt Lake LDS temple.

The couple came to the Nyssa area approximately 15 years ago, and until failing health forced him to retire, the deceased was affiliated with his brother, Max, in a business known as Mitchell Brother's Owyhee garage at Owyhee junction.

Mr. Mitchell was a member of the LDS church and had served on a mission in Holland. During World War II he was in the Merchant Marines.

In addition to his widow of rural Nyssa, he is survived by two brothers, Max E. Mitchell of route 1, Nyssa, and James Mitchell of Clinton, Utah; two sisters, Mrs. Norma Moss of West Point, Utah, and Phyllis Andreason of Whittier, Calif. The deceased's mother died Jan. 1, 1956, and his father succumbed in February this year.

Local funeral arrangements are under direction of Lienkaemper chapel and interment will be made in an Ogdan cemetery. Pallbearers will be brothers-in-law of the deceased.

New books going into circulation Saturday, May 23, at Malheur county library include the following.

"Search in the Desert" by John Marco Allegro. The story of an archaeological expedition into the Judean wilderness.

"Empire of the Inca" by Burr Cartwright Brundage. Primary sources are used to advantage by a historian who plots the rise and fall of the Inca civilization.

"Fossils in America" by Jay Ellis Ransom. An introduction and basic reference to prehistoric life with over 100 drawings and photographs.

"Imagination" by Harold Rugg. A distinguished educator's inquiry into the sources and expression of creativity.

"The Idea Invaders" by George N. Gordon. An analysis of propaganda techniques.

"Presidential Elections" by Nelson W. Polsby. An explanation of the organization of parties, the operation of the electoral college and other political aspects.

"Strength to Love" by Martin Luther King. Seventeen sermons by a noted Negro minister.

"What Is Poetry?" by John Hall Wheelock. In these essays the author discusses the nature of poetry, both contemporary and of the past.

"Testing" by Henry Chauncey. An authoritative and balanced discussion of what tests, as partners of teaching, can and cannot do.

"Their Heads Are Green and Their Hands Are Blue" by Paul Bowles. Nine travel essays.

"A Day in the Life of President Kennedy" by James Bishop. The last intimate portrait of President Kennedy.

"Mother's Blue Hen" by Sam Anderson. The author relates the activities of his mother who scoured the countryside around their home in search of antiques.

"The Grail" by Babs H. Deal. A novel picturing the world of football in a large southern university.

### Regional Meeting Of City Officials Slated in Ontario

The deceased was born Oct. 25, 1933, at Nyssa, a son of Farrell and Fern Newby Ransom. He attended Nyssa schools and at the age of 19 years joined the Navy and served for three years at a San Diego base. He was a member of the LDS church.

He was united in marriage to Judy Timmons in June 1959 by Bishop Charles Mann at his home in the Apple Valley community.

Mr. Ransom had worked some time as a service station attendant and at time of his death was employed by Honstead Motor company in Nampa.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by one daughter, Tina, age four years; a son, Michael, one year old; and his parents of 717 North First street, Nyssa.

Other survivors include three brothers, Neil who is in the Navy stationed at Oceanside, Calif., Bob of Pasco, Wash., and Elwin of Nyssa; two sisters, Dora Lee Jaurique of Fresno, Calif., and Shirley Ballou of Marsing, Idaho.

Lienkaemper chapel is in charge of funeral arrangements, and military services will be conducted by members of American Legion post 79 at the Nyssa cemetery where interment will be made. Pallbearers will be cousins of the deceased.

### College Tax Base in Doubt

The tax base request of \$147,000 by Treasure Valley Community college was reported as beaten by 2250 to 1984 in the Sunday edition of a Boise daily carrying a Vale dateline. However, the Monday edition of the Ontario paper says two precincts of Baker county went strongly for approval and it now appears it carries by 69 votes.

All figures used are unofficial as the county court is still in the process of canvassing the votes and true results will not be available for several days.

The \$30 million bond issue for higher education and community colleges was approved in both state and county. The county vote was 2027 yes and 1499 no. The college in Ontario expects to benefit about \$225,000 for building funds from this source.
