turned to Malheur county. This was the start of his participation in three wars.

Returning to Vale in 1920, he was appointed chief deputy assessor for Malheur county and served in that capacity for nine years.

On Feb. 1, 1929, Don came to Nyssa and assumed management of the Nyssa Realty company, handling real estate and insurance. The agency is now operated by his son-in-law, Ralph G. Lawrence, who took over in 1947 when Don was appointed justice of the peace.

In World War II and Korea

He enlisted in the Navy during January 1942 and served in Alaska, the Pacific area, Portland and Norfolk, Va., during World War II.

Remaining in the Naval Reserve, he was called up for active duty during the Korean conflict and again served his country for 14 months, seven of which were in the battle area.

A story of "Men About Town" in the Journal in 1956 said the Judge had received 17 medals from three countries, stars and citations, and numerous commendations. One was for being wounded in action while in France during World War I.

Married in Edinburgh

Judge Graham was married to Jessie Christie in July of 1915 at Edinburgh, Scotland. Their children are Ethel Graham Lawrence, Doris Graham Lawrence of Nyssa and Raymond Graham of Quincy, Wash. Mrs. Graham died in 1947.

On Feb. 11, 1948, Don was united in marriage to Nora Berry Wheeler at Vale by his brother David, now deceased, who was justice of the peace at that time.

In addition to his widow, Nora, and three children, other survivors are two brothers, Andrew of Vale and Kenneth of Selah, Wash.; two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Kilpatrick of Selah and Mrs. Jean Frazier of England; 10 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Funeral Services Today

Services, with military honors by four American Legion posts of the county, will be conducted at 2 p.m. today (Thursday) May 28, 1964, at Lienkaemper chapel with the Rev. Paul Ludlow officiating.

Burial will be in Nyssa cemetery.
