

Two Volumes on Russian Ideology Head New List at Malheur Library

New books going into circulation Monday, June 1, at Malheur county library include the following:

"**Lenin, Stalin, Khrushchev: Voices of Bolshevism**" edited by Robert H. McNeal. This collection of articles and documents by three Communist leaders reflects the official views of the major problems which have confronted the Russian Communist party at each stage of its growth.

"**The Bolshevik Tradition**" by Robert H. McNeal. This introduction to the turbulent politics of 20th century Russia traces the rise of the Bolshevik party through the careers of the three great dictators who have done most to create and perpetuate Bolshevism.

"**Old Societies and New States**" by Chicago University Committee for the Comparative Study of New Nations. A collection of eight studies which deal with some of the central problems facing the new nations today.

"**The Story of Insulin**" by G. A. Wrenshall. Forty years of success against diabetes.

"**Escape From Alcatraz**" by J. Campbell Bruce. The story of Alcatraz, the world's most dreaded prison since the closing of Devil's Island.

"**Fly and the Fly Bottle**" by Ved Mehta. Subtle interpretations of English philosophy and history.

"**The Coin of Contraband**" by Garland Roark. The true story of U.S. Customs Inspector Al Scharrf.

"**Curiosities of Medicine**" edited by Berton Roueche. This book contains case studies and other unusual phenomena.

"**Comandos for Christ**" by Bruce E. Porterfield. The author's account of his experiences as a missionary in Bolivia.

"**Malaya**" by J. M. Gulick. The early as well as the more recent history of the Federated Malay States and Singapore and their recent successor as of Aug. 31, 1963—Malaysia.

"**The American Political Process**" edited by Leonard W. Levy. How the American government works.

"**Don't Knock the Corners Off**" by Carolyn Glyn. A novel written by a 15-year-old girl in England tells the story of a precocious nine-year-old whose parents treat her as an equal.

"**The Loser**" by Borden Deal. A novel that tells about a young lawyer who was asked by several influential citizens to run for governor, but not to win.

"**A River Ran Out of Eden**" by James Vance Marshall. A story of innocence and guile set in the Aleutian wilderness.

"**Asia A to Z**" by Robert S. Kane. A candid appraisal of today's Asia.

"**Never Cry Wolf**" by Farley Mowat. A biologist from the Canadian government describes his experience in the Arctic watching and tracking the activities of a wolf family.

"**Pirate, Pawnee and Mountain Man**" by John Myers Myers. A documented account of Hugh Glass, legendary hero of the old West.

"**All Along the River**" by Nellie Ireton Mills. A history of life along the Payette river.

"**American Negro Poetry**" edited by Arna Bontemps. A collection of 171 poems by 55 poets covering a span of 70 years.

"**For the Young Viewer**" edited by Ralph Garry. A survey by an educator, children's programming specialist and psychologist describes 425 children's programs broadcast by 223 television stations throughout the U.S., including Alaska and Hawaii, during the past two seasons.

"**The Lonely Voice**" by Frank O'Connor. A study of the short story.

"**Tattooing**" by Elsie A. Ashdown. Complete instructions explained with illustrations.

"**The Venetian Affair**" by Helen MacInnes. A novel of romance, adventure and international espionage.

"**The King's Orchard**" by Agnes Sligh Turnbull. A novel that tells the story of an Irishman, educated in Paris, who takes on the rigorous pioneer life on the frontier of America in 1772.

"**Dingo**" by Mary Patchett. The story of a boy and his love for a wild Australian dog.

"**Matter**" by Ralph E. Lapp. Another volume of the "Life Science Library."

"**Judaism**" by Ben Zion Bokser. The author portrays the Jewish heritage of faith, its view of the universe, its conception of God and man, its structure of rites and symbols, and its system of values.

"**American Drama Since World War II**" by Gerald Weales. A survey and critical commentary.

"**The Player**" by Lillian Ross. An account of 55 outstanding actors and actresses of our time.

"**A Time for Cooking**" by Zada Taylor. A book that will help the housekeeper in planning and preparing delicious meals.

"**Naked Came I**" by David Weiss. A novel about Auguste Rodin, the French sculptor, and the people around him.

"**The Prophets for the Common Reader**" by Mary Ellen Chase. A book written to make more real the personalities and the powers of the great men of ancient Israel whose words have come down to us with such magnificence.

"**The Road to Huddersfield: A Journey to Five Continents**" by James Morris. A description of the work and organization of the World Bank.

Wheelin' Along

An automobile engine's most formidable enemy is the same opponent fought against by housewives—common dust. The average engine uses approximately 9,000 gallons (or 1,200 cubic feet) of air for every gallon of gasoline it burns.

In that air are dust particles, some so small they cannot be seen by the naked eye; nevertheless, they are hard—and sharp—enough to damage piston rings and cylinders.

The function of the air cleaner is, of course, to filter out these harmful dust particles, but even the finest air cleaners cannot remove all of these impurities which often find their way into the engine's oil system, via the cylinder walls.

Once in the oil, these contaminants have a "field day," working busily on rings, cylinders and other engine parts and, in some engines, restricting the air intake enough so that gasoline is wasted because of too rich a fuel mixture.

Thus, the reason for an oil filter. When properly maintained, it will screen out much of this harmful material, prolonging the life of the engine. Unfortunately, the filter does not eliminate all of the dust and, while collecting much of it, tends to become clogged, minimizing its filtering effect and allowing the particles free reign, once again.

In addition to dust, there are numerous other contaminants which somehow find their way into the oil stream and concentrate on destroying the engine, including water, soot, sludge, acids and other deposits.

These are some of the reasons there is so much preaching about changing oil and oil filters. It's a good recommendation and one which can save the car owner many dollars in the long run.

Suggested frequency of oil changes varies from automobile manufacturers to petroleum industries, but a reasonable guide to follow is to change oil every 60 to 90 days in summer months and every 30 to 60 days in the winter.

And—replace the filter with at least every other oil change.

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Physical Fitness Lost a Comrade

Physical education has lost a steadfast friend—a man who believed in its importance for everyone, everywhere.

The late John F. Kennedy, more than any other President in history, took steps to keep America physically fit. "The strength of our democracy," he wrote, "is no greater than the collective well-being of our people."

"The vigor of our country is no stronger than the vitality and will of our countrymen. The level of physical, mental, moral and spiritual fitness of every American must be our constant concern."

"The need for increased attention to the physical fitness of our youth is clearly established. Although today's young people are fundamentally healthier than the youth of any previous generation, the majority have not developed strong, agile bodies. The softening process of our civilization continues to carry on its persistent erosion."

Improves Fitness Program

John F. Kennedy's record on behalf of physical fitness is impressive. He strengthened the President's Council on Physical Fitness—begun in the Eisenhower administration as the President's Council on Youth Fitness. The council—under Mr. Kennedy's inspiration—publicized the need for daily exercise in all our schools.

It published its Blue Book with suggested tests and exercises to help physical educators identify and strengthen boys and girls who needed help everywhere. During his administration the American people—young and old—were made aware of the importance of keeping fit.

Exercises Within Schedule

John F. Kennedy was an athlete and friend of athletics on the playing fields of America. He was a football player at Harvard (though he never made the varsity), a college swimmer and a fine golfer. In his adult life he exercised as much as his schedule would permit.

President Kennedy was conscious of the American image on the world's athletic fields. This is why he interceded in the AAU-NCAA hassle which threatened to weaken our 1964 Olympic teams. He appointed the late General Douglas MacArthur to mediate the dispute and let the word go forth from Washington that the contending forces must come to agreement. And, as we all know, his action led to a temporary truce until after the 1964 Olympics.

Physical educators have lost a great friend. The best tribute we can pay to his memory is hard work—to make sure that America's youth and adult population does not forget his dedication to better health and physical fitness.
