### Vale BLM Project Inspection Tour Planned June 10

Members of the Bureau of Land Management Multiple Use Advisory board will get a first-hand look at Vale project achievements next week on June 10. The 18-member board will see range plowing in progress, as well as recent crested wheatgrass seedings.

Board members also will view well-established seedings that are now being grazed by livestock. They will observe stock water developments and areas where undesirable brush has been controlled through use of aerially applied herbicides. Range management practices will be described by BLM personnel during the tour.

On June 9 Russell E. Getty, director of BLM operations in Oregon and Washington, will review accomplishments of the Vale project with details presented by the Vale district staff.

Now nearing completion of its second year of operation, the Vale project was authorized by congress to increase the range productivity and other benefits derived from 4.5 million acres of public land managed by BLM in the Vale district, located in the southeastern corner of Oregon, according to Getty.

Warne Nunn, executive assistant to Governor Mark Hatfield, will speak at a dinner meeting of the group Tuesday evening, June 9.

During an afternoon session the board will consider methods of financing improvements on private range lands which are managed in conjunction with public lands. The board also will consider pending congressional proposals to establish a Public Land Law Review commission and to give legislative sanction to the principle of multiple use management on public lands which are classified for such use.

### Miss Pauline Butler Awarded Scholarship To OCE at Monmouth

### IFYE Delegate From Korea to Reside For Twenty Days With Phifer Family

Miss Kil-Ji-Kim, an International Farm Youth Exchange delegate from Pohana City, Korea, will arrive in Malheur county June 20, according to Helen Dwell, Malheur county agent. Miss Kim will reside with Mr. and Mrs. Jim Phifer and Jeannette from June 20 through July 10. The Phifers operate a dairy farm near Adrian.

International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE) is a 4-H program for selected young people to live and work with rural people in other countries for four to six months. Miss Kim is among 115 exchangees from 42 countries in the United States this summer. This year 110 U.S. delegates are residing with host families in other countries.

During her stay in Oregon, Miss Kim will also make her home with families in Polk and Linn counties.

In Korea Miss Kim's home is on a six-acre farm where her family raises rice, barley, millet, soybeans, potatoes, radishes and other vegetables. Their farm livestock includes swine, poultry, goats and a Korean ox. Miss Kim, 21 years old, speaks Korean but can understand English if it is spoken slowly. During her three-week stay in Malheur county, the Korean exchangee will visit numerous organizations, businesses, farms and homes in order to learn as much as possible about the American way of life.
