Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Tuesday For Mary A. Cornell

Funeral rites for Mary Annie Cornell, 82, were conducted Tuesday afternoon, June 16, 1964, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of the Nyssa Methodist church.

Mrs. Cornell succumbed Friday in a Nyssa nursing home following an extended illness.

She was born March 22, 1882, in Carrollton, Mo., a daughter of Jonathan and Ettie Reynolds Ingram and on Oct. 23, 1907, was married to Rufus Cornell in Kansas.

The family left Meade county, Kan., around 1912, moved to Big Pine, Calif., and in 1933 came to the Nyssa area where they farmed until Mr. Cornell retired in 1940. In August that year they took over management of the Nyssa bowling alley, then located at the present site of Schoen Studios. They operated the business for approximately three years. Mr. Cornell succumbed on July 1, 1960.

Mrs. Cornell was a member of the Methodist church and at one time an active member of the Oregon Trail Grange.

Among survivors are three sons, Russell of Seattle, Lawrence of Boise and James Cornell of Cottage Grove, Ore.; four daughters, Mrs. Thelma Dalton of Huntington Park, Calif., Mrs. Zelma Cowden of Port Hueneme Calif., Mrs. Clella Jamieson of Nyssa and Mrs. Mildred Massa of Boise.
