No 'Me-Too' Mainstream

Governor Nelson Rockefeller, in the first burst of political generosity of his career, has offered his support to Pennsylvania's off-again, on-again, gone-again Governor Scranton in his apparently self-propelled Stop Goldwater movement.

While Governor Rockefeller did not go so far as to offer his delegates, too, he did offer some advice to the GOP. "The hour is late," he said informatively, and added, "but if all leaders in the moderate mainstream of the Republican party will unite upon a platform and upon Governor Scranton as the candidate, the moderate cause can still be won."

It should, perhaps, be explained that "moderate" is the new designation that the liberal and/or "middle-of-the-road" contingent of Republicanism have decided on as more appealing to the party membership-at-large which is beginning to rally to the hope of leadership that is more concerned with the revitalization of the United States than with its "image" in the UN, or Moscow, or anywhere else.

As for this "mainstream" business, the trickles that have been diverted by the Messrs. Romney and Scranton and Nixon and Stassen (are there some we've overlooked?) combined with the Rockefeller babbling brook will hardly distract any thoughtful observer from the fact that the mainstream of Republicanism is flowing, not leftward, but to the right.

This will become more and more apparent as the "moderate" soothsayers of press, radio and TV—who have been scouring thesaurus and gutter for invective and innuendo to hurl at Senator Goldwater—become gradually less shrill and less confident of the moral (?) support of the proprietors of their communications media.

When the Republican Republicans become sufficiently annoyed, it will be time for the moderate (or liberal, or middle-of-the-road) Republicans to do the compromising that has been demanded of the forthright Arizonan.
