10,000-Pound Cake of Cheddar Cheese Processed at Tillamook; Sells for \$5000

Tillamook Cheese and Dairy association, cheesemakers of Tillamook county, Ore., have completed manufacture of the biggest cake of cheese ever produced in the western part of the United States—a 10,000-pound "Premium Brand" top quality cheddar.

The cheese stands over eight feet high and is seven feet wide. The ventilation shaft through center of the big wheel is about the size of a telephone pole.

Milking From 2500 Cows

According to Basil Tone, cheese superintendent for the Tillamook organization, 100,000 pounds of fresh milk was used in the huge cheese. This represents one milking from 2500 Tillamook dairy cows. The milk contained 4500 pounds of butterfat testing 4.1½ percent. Seven processing vats were required to hold the fluid.

Other ingredients used in manufacture of the record-size cheese included 325 pounds of salt, 200 ounces of Rennet (a substance that causes milk to coagulate into curds) and 130 ounces of coloring.

Tone said the complete process of assembling the big cheese took around four hours continual work with a crew of 20 men. Head cheesemaker was Fritz Baumgarten.

Plant One of Largest in World

Production of the cheese took place at the TCDA number one factory in Tillamook. The plant is recognized as one of the two largest in the world.

The cheese will be aged for around six months and then transported on a flatbed logging truck to California. A 50,000 ton "Lumberjack" lift has been leased to load the mammoth dairy product.

The cheese has been purchased by Don Wetzel, representing Crawford's country store of El Monte, Calif. It will be used for sales promotion. Wetzel's cost was around \$5000.
