Used Car Dealers Offer Warranty Service to Buyers

"This is especially important with the vacation season starting," says Wentworth. "There are hundreds of 'GW' dealers ready to honor this warranty certificate in all the adjoining states and British Columbia and Alberta."

"They can be identified readily from their display of the familiar 'GW' oval emblem. Motorists can obtain a state-by-state list of all 'GW' dealers in North America, free, by writing to the Oregon Automobile Dealers association at 1025 S.W. Harrison Street, Portland 1."

"GW" dealers, because they are franchised new car outlets, use factory parts in making "GW" repairs, Wentworth notes, and the "GW" covers many maintenance items skipped by other warranties — including tires, mufflers, batteries, brake adjusting, wheel-balancing, etc.

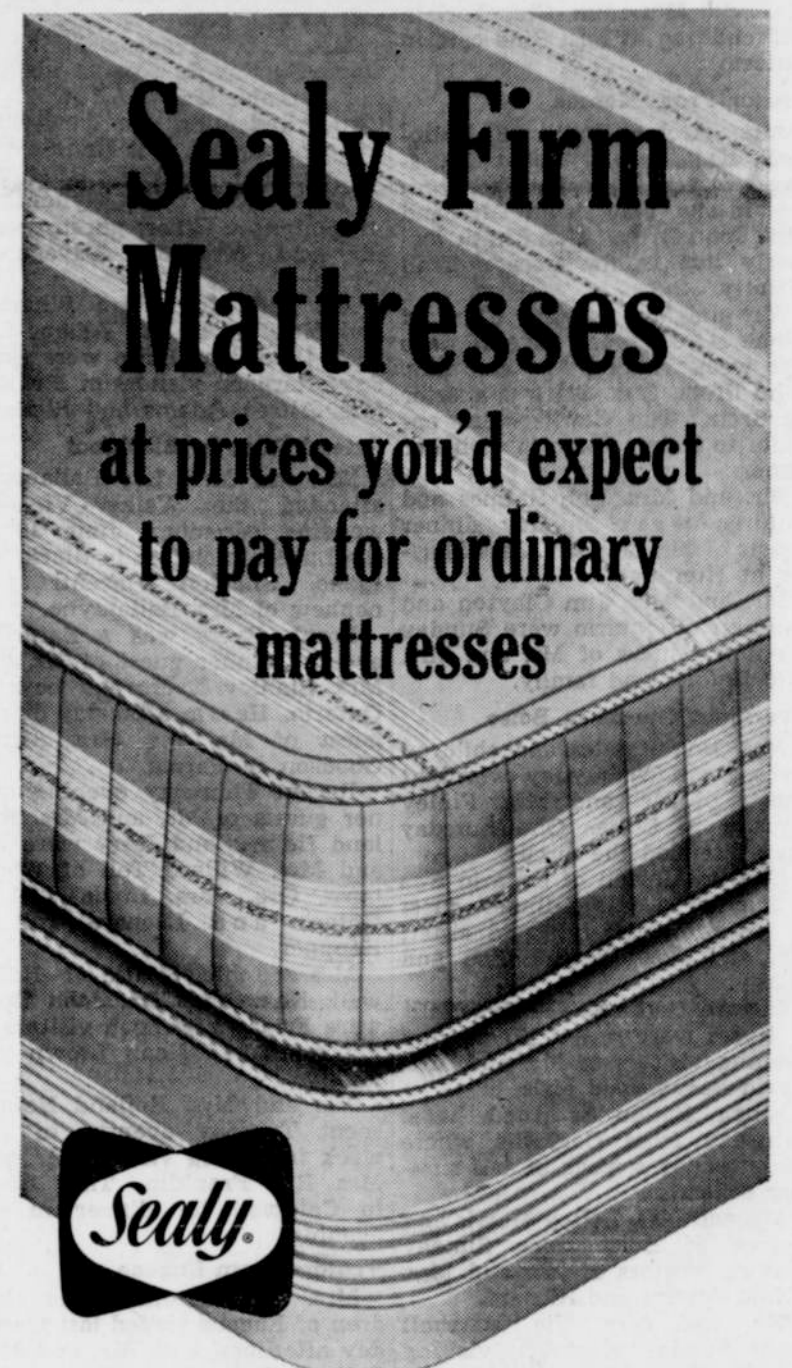
