## Merritt M. Greeling Rites Held Monday At Nyssa Cemetery

Graveside services for Merritt M. Greeling of Pocatello were conducted Monday morning at the Nyssa cemetery.

Mr. Greeling, 58, was a former resident of the Nyssa-Adrian area. He succumbed Wednesday, June 17, 1964, in Moran, Wyo., after suffering an apparent heart attack. He was vice president of the Golob Oil company of Pocatello and was on special assignment for the firm in Moran.

He was born Aug. 12, 1905, at Olathe, Kan., a son of Merritt Monroe and Lena Hickox Greeling. He spent his early years in the Sunflower state and in 1917 moved to Adrian with his parents.

The deceased attended the University of Idaho at Moscow and was graduated in 1930 from the college of education. Following his graduation he was employed by Standard Oil company for 10 years and during that time worked in Nyssa.

During World War II, he served in the infantry and in the quartermaster corps for five years and advanced to lieutenant colonel. He remained in the re-
