"Invisible Latin America" by Samuel Shapiro. The author surveys five different countries representing the main stages of political growth in the southern hemisphere.

"The Coming Explosion in Latin America" by Gerald Clark. The author sets forth the forces and personalities that have molded Latin America—from the Conquistadores to the Alliance for Progress.

"Night Comes to the Cumberlands" by Harry M. Caudill. A biography of a depressed area.

"Jeep Trails to Colorado Ghost Towns" by Robert L. Brown. A selective, alphabetical guide to Colorado ghost towns. The author supplies pertinent historical information, specific travel directions and his own photographs.

"The Protectors" by Harry J. Anslinger. An account of our battle against the crime gangs.

"Man in God's World" by Helmut Thieliicke. Selections from weekly lectures, during three years of the Nazi tyranny, delivered in the Stuttgart Cathedral church.

"What Science Knows About Life" by Dr. Heinz Woltreck. A German scientist presents a survey of biology that begins with the origin and nature of life and then describes its various forms, their evolution and functions.

"Decorating Guide" by House and Garden. Ideas to help you plan your home.

"Rascal's Heaven" by Van Wyck Mason. A novel about General Oglethorpe and his colony in Georgia.

"The Book of the Dance" by Agnes DeMille. A handsome historical survey.

"Armageddon" by Leon Uris. Choosing Berlin as his Armageddon—the mystical place where the final battle between good and evil will be fought—the author tells the story of this city from its capture by the Russians in 1945 through four-power occupation and the heroic airlift.
