Per Capita Income and Job Production In Oregon Surpass Washington State

For the first time in 15 years Oregon's per capita income has exceeded that of its neighbor to the north—Washington.

Oregon's per capita income for 1963 registered \$2,515 while the state of Washington scored \$2,505. Not since 1948 has Oregon's per capita income been above Washington's.

Preliminary estimates for 1963 also show Oregon's per capita income running 102.9 percent of the national average.

Oregon's job producing ability for the 1963 year was ahead of Washington, as well. The Beaver state registered a 12,200 net gain in total employment while on the other side of the Columbia, Washingtonians saw a net loss of 9,400 jobs in the same year.

Personal income also looks good in Oregon. Compared with the same period last year—first quar-

ter—personal income is up 8.3 percent, while Washington lags behind the national average at 4.2 percent. U.S. average is at 5.6 percent.

Figures from the Oregon Department of Planning and Development indicated the state's employment gain came in the non-agricultural area with 15,900 new jobs created in 1963. Agriculture saw a drop of 3,700 jobs, resulting in the net gain of 12,200 new jobs for the state.

Washington, on the other hand, saw its loss in the non-agricultural area with two-thirds from cutbacks in aircraft employment.
