Albert L. Notheis Services Conducted Wednesday Morning

Funeral services for Albert Leander Notheis were conducted Wednesday morning, July 1, 1964, at Blessed Sacrament church in Ontario with Father John Baumgartner officiating.

Mr. Notheis succumbed Saturday at the Veterans' hospital in Boise following an extended illness.

He was born Oct. 28, 1893, at Corning, Kan., a son of Leander F. and Mina Gudenkauf Notheis. He grew up and attended schools in the Sunflower state.

In 1915 he joined the Marine corps, enlisted in the army in 1917 and served in France during World War I. He was a member of the Catholic church.

On June 28, 1918, he was married to Alice Willard in Winchester, Hampshire, England. Shortly after the war was over, the couple returned to the United States and began farming near Flaudreau in Moody County, S.D. In 1935 they settled in the Sunset Valley area southwest of Nyssa, under the Owyhee irrigation project, and had resided there since.

In addition to Mrs. Notheis of the home, route 2, Nyssa, other survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Clarice Poor, also of route 2, Nyssa, and a sister, Mrs. Rose Rine of Portland. A son, Lt. Alvin Lee Notheis, succumbed in 1946.

Interment was made in St. John's cemetery at Ontario under the direction of Lienkaemper funeral home, with military rites by American Legionnaires of Nyssa post 79.

Pallbearers were Jack Elliot, Charles Schweizer, Ira Price, Sr., Delbert Garner, Ira Price, Jr., and Art Neeley.
